#### TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham in the County of Hillsborough [L. S.] in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the E. G. Sherburne School, in the "All Purpose Room," in said Pelham on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. A.—To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- B. To bring in your ballot on the following question: "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be declared no longer in effect in this town."
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same, that is, if the Town will vote to accept the Town Budget as prepared by the Budget Committee and to take action thereon.
- 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when they make their appraisal in April.
- 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$708.27 as the Town's share of Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$4,721.83 as the State's share, as provided by law.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to request the State Tax Commission to reappraise improved lands and buildings in order to equalize all assessments within the Town on a proportional basis, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,800.00 for this purpose.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$18,900.00 for the purchase of a new caterpillar Diesel motor grader, Model No. 112 equipped with tandem drive, 12-foot

blade, 13:00 x 24 low pressure tires, muffler, leaning wheel front



electric starter for gas engine, 200 watt generator with lights, rain traps, hydraulic steering booster, hydraulic blade sideshift, 12-foot snow wing and "V" snow plow, weighing about 29,631 pounds, and, to meet said appropriation, to issue and sell notes of the Town in the principal amount of \$18,900.00 pursuant to the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, such notes to be payable as to principal in not more than (6) six equal annual installments, to be dated, mature, be payable at such places, bear interest at such rate payable on such dates, and to be otherwise in form and substance as the Selectmen of the Town shall in their discretion decide.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$100.00 to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the 37 other communities in this region, or act in relation thereto.
- 10. A—To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to obtain and follow the recommendations of the Chief of Police of the Town with respect to the expenditure of any funds received from the New Hampshire Jockey Club, Inc., for traffic control purposes.
- B—To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen to consult with the Chief of Police before hiring any special police officers to do police or traffic work in the Town.
- \$12,000.00 as the Town's share of Town Bridge Aid for the reconstruction of Bridge Number 074/141, a Town bridge on the north west end of Tallant Road in the Town of Pelham, and to meet said appropriation, to issue and sell notes of the Town in the principal amount of \$12,000.00 pursuant to the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, such notes to be payable as to principal in not more than (4) four equal annual installments, to be dated, mature, be payable at such places, bear interest at such rate payable on such dates, and to be otherwise in form and substance as the Selectmen of the Town shall in their discretion decide.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purchase and installation of street and road signs.

13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following By-Law:

#### MOTORS

All power plants, stationary engines, auxiliary motors, Diesel motors, turbine motors, and any other type engine shall be equipped with mufflers and silencers and whatever other accessories as may be necessary so that no unreasonable disturbance to the public is occasioned thereby.

#### PENALTY

Any person, persons, group or organization which shall violate this By-Law shall be fined a sum not exceeding ten (\$10.00) dollars for each offence.

- 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the graveling of cemetery roads and lanes.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 for the installation of sanitary facilities, well, pump, hand sink, and necessary plumbing and other repairs for the Public Library, or to take any other action thereon.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to accept with gratitude, the wrought iron fence, entrance, and macadam surfacing of the Marsh Road side of the Gibson Cemetery, and which was recently completed in behalf of the Town, by the Muldoon brothers of Pelham.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for cutting brush within the limits of the town roads.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Pelham as follows:
- (1) Amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Pelham by inserting therein after Article I a new article numbered "Article IA Districts" and reading as follows:

#### ARTICLE 1A

#### DISTRICTS

For the purpose of this Ordinance the Town of Pelham is divided into districts as shown on the Zoning Map filed with the Town Clerk and dated February 15, 1958, and including the following:

IIA Residential—To include all of the Town of Pelham not otherwise included in District IIIB Business

IHB Business—To include all land on both sides of Route 38 to a depth of 250 feet on each side extending from the Dracut, Massachusetts state line to the first bridge across Beaver Brook.

- (2) Amend Article II of the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Pelham by adding the following definitions thereto, and numbered as follows:
  - (5) Home Produce and Products means and includes everything of an agricultural nature grown, produced, conditioned or otherwise carried on the property of the resident, also such articles as are manufactured or altered by members of the household of the bona fide resident of any property.

- (6) Permanent Residents. A family shall be considered permanent residents when they have used any building continuously as a residence for a period of
  - six months or more.
- (7) TOURIST HOME shall mean any place consisting of a room or groups of rooms located on one premises where transient accommodations for sleeping or living purposes for not more than six persons are provided for a price.
- (8) Junk means any old metals, old bottles, cotton or woolen mill waste, unfinished cloth, unfinished cotton or woolen mill yarns, old paper products, old rubber products, two or more unregistered motor vehicles, and other second hand articles the accumulation of which is detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood.
- (9) TRAILER CAMP means a land area, occupied or designed for occupancy by two or more trailers or camp cars in use for living purposes.
- (3) Amend Article III of the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Pelham by inserting after the heading Article III the words "General Provisions," said heading of Article III to read as follows:

# ARTICLE III GENERAL PROVISIONS

- (4) Amend Article III of the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Pelham by adding the following provisions in addition thereto and numbered and reading as follows:
  - (5) No junk yard or place for the storage of discarded machinery, vehicles, or other scrap materials shall be maintained in any District, except that after public hearing in which evidence on both sides is heard, the Board of Adjustment shall have authority to decide whether the permit shall be issued or not.
  - (6) No owner or occupant of land in any District shall permit a fire or other ruins to be left but shall remove the same within two years.
  - (7) Any uses that may be obnoxious or injurious by reason of the production or emission or odor, dust, smoke, refuse matter, fumes, noise vibrations, or similar conditions, or that are dangerous to the comfort, peace, enjoyment, health or safety of the community or lending to its disturbance or annoyance are prohibited in any District.
  - (8) No signs shall be permitted except the following: Town and State highway directional and regulatory signs, historic signs and those signs used to advertise the profession or goods dealt in by owner or occupant of property on which placed. No sign or group of signs shall exceed 15 square feet, outside dimensions, and none shall be placed so as to obstruct the view on the highway.
- (5) Amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Pelham by inserting therein—after Article III a new Article numbered and reading "Article IIIA Residential Districts" and said Article IIIA to read as follows:

#### ARTICLE IIIA RESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS

The Residential District shall enjoy the following provisions:

- (1) It shall be a district mainly of residences and farms and truck or home gardens, excluding any use injurious, noxious, or offensive to the neighborhood but including the sale of produce raised on the premises.
- (2) No building shall house more than two families as permanent residents.
- (3) Home produce and products may be bought and sold and exposed for sale in this district.
- (4) Tourist homes may be maintained and operated in this district.

- (5) Residences may be used to house such uses by the owner or tenant as offices for doctor, engineer, architect, lawyer, real estate and insurance, or other recognized profession and such home occupations as hairdressing, dressmaking, manufacture of craft products, manufacture of food products, except that the number of persons employed at any one location shall not number more than four persons in addition to the owner or tenant.
- (6) Churches, schools and sanitaria are permitted in this district.
- (7) Property owners of enterprises shall be allowed two advertising signs for produce sold on the premises, such signs not to total over fifteen square feet in area; also one or more signs pertaining to the lease, sale or use of a lot or building on which placed, which shall not exceed a total area of five square feet.
- (8) No land in this district shall be used for a dump or for the storage of abandoned vehicles or part thereof, junk, scrap paper, rags or discarded materials of any kind, nor used in a manner that is disorderly, unsightly, noxious or detrimental to or prejudicial to the general welfare.
- (9) The removal of sod, loam, clay, sand, gravel, or other natural inorganic material from any premises in this District is allowed in instances when such removal is (1) incidental to the lawful construction or alteration of a building or structure, or the lawful construction of a way (including driveway), on the portion of the premises where removal occurs; or (2) incidental to the construction or operation of public works by the Town or State at the location where the removal occurs. Otherwise, the removal of such materials or any of them from any premises in any District is prohibited except that such removal may be authorized by the Board of Adjustment by special permit in any instance where the Board determines that the removal will be advantageous to the premises in question or to the neighborhood or otherwise desirable and will be of such character and can be so accomplished that by proper re-grading, re-loaming, re-seeding or other means which shall be required, assure that the premises will be left in sightly condition and protected against erosion.
- (10) No land in this district shall be used for a commercial trailer park or for the location of a trailer for residential purposes.
- (11) No land in this district shall be used for business purposes except that established businesses may remain in their present locations, or may relocate within said District in locations approved by the Board of Adjustment: and new business may be allowed to locate on land in said District only after having appealed to and received from the Board of Adjustment written approval of the establishment of such business. Such business, however, shall be of a nature which is not detrimental to the general welfare, nor contrary to the general intent and purpose of this ordinance.
- (6) Amend the Zoning Ordinances of the Town of Pelham by inserting after Article IIIa a new article numbered and reading "Article IIIa Business District." and said Article IIIa shall read as follows:

# ARTICLE IIIB BUSINESS DISTRICT

The following shall be permitted in the Business District:

 Any use in the residential and agricultural district under the same provisions as apply to residences in that district. (2) Lodging houses, apartment houses, hotels, motels, tourist courts or cabins, including such retail businesses within these permitted buildings as are con-

ducted for the convenience of the residents or guests.

- (3) Shops, restaurants and other retail and wholesale businesses.
- (4) Garages, parking lots and filling stations.
- (5) Business offices and banks.
- (6) Theaters, halls, clubs.
- (7) If any proposed use is such to attract vehicles, ample space shall be provided on the property to accommodate all such vehicles attracted by the business.
- (8) Commercial trailer park and residential trailers.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Building Regulations of the Town of Pelham Part No. 3, by adding an addition thereto.

All permits issued by the Building Inspector shall expire one year from date of issuance. Said permits may be renewed for an additional year by payment of a fee of one dollar.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### The Following is for the General Information of the Public

RE: ARTICLE 10-A, OF THE TOWN WARRANT 1958

Revised Statutes Annotated, State of N. H.—Chapter 41-41:29

Duties—The Town Treasurer shall have the custody of all moneys belonging to the Town, and shall pay out the same only upon orders of the Selectmen. He shall deposit the same in solvent banks in the state except that whenever it shall prove advantageous to any town near the state boundary to deposit town funds in banks outside the state, the Treasurer may deposit the same in said banks upon the approval of the state bank commissioner. The amount deposited in any bank shall not exceed sixty per cent of its paid up capital and surplus. He shall keep in suitable books provided for the purpose a fair and correct account of all sums received into and paid from the town treasury, and of all notes given by the town, with the particulars thereof. At the close of each fiscal year he shall make a report to the town, giving a particular account of all his financial transactions during the year. He shall furnish to the Selectmen statements from his books, for examination, whenever so requested.

Revised Statutes Annotated, State of N. H.—Chapter 41—41:9

Financial Duties—The Selectmen shall pay all sums of money received by them in behalf of the Town to the Town Treasurer immediately after receipt, and state to him from whom and for what received. They shall draw orders upon the Treasurer for the payment of all accounts and claims against the Town allowed by them, and take proper vouchers therefor. They shall keep a fair and correct account of all moneys received, all accounts and claims settled and all orders drawn by them, and of all their other financial transactions in behalf of the Town.

RE: ARTICLE 10-B, OF THE TOWN WARRANT 1958

Revised Statutes Annotated, State of N. H.--Chapter 105 -105:1

Appointment—The Selectmen of a town, when they deem it necessary, may appoint special police officers, one of whom may be superintendent and they shall continue in office during the pleasure of the Selectmen, or until their successors are chosen or appointed.

#### RE: ARTICLES IN TOWN WARRANT:

Selectmen may insert any articles of their own accord and frequently insert articles at the simple request of interested voters, they must insert articles "upon the written application of ten or more voters or one-sixth of the voters in town, presented to the Selectmen or one of them at least twenty-five days before the day prescribed for an annual or biennial meeting." (Thus the reason this article is being inserted.)

#### SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Board of Selectmen Pelham, New Hampshire Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Pelham for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1957, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

#### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Cemetery Trust Committee, Library and Municipal Court.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets—December 31, 1956-December 31, 1957: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1956 and December 31, 1957, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$2,283.52, from \$5,488.25 to \$3,204.73, in 1957.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & Λ-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1957, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$3,469.13, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$3,375.79, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$93.34.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31,

in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1957, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

#### AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

#### GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Deficit:

It is noted that the current deficit (excess of current liabilities over total assets) decreased by \$2,283.52 from \$5,488.25 to \$3,204.73, in 1957, as shown herewith:

Inasmuch as all of the liabilities were current (i.e.—no long term notes or bonds outstanding) the current deficit and net debt were of like amounts. The decrease in 1957 was due to a deficiency appropriation of \$2,200.00 in that year.

Appropriation Overdrafts and Application of Municipal Budget Law:

It is noted that in the fiscal year ended December 31, 1957, there was a net overdraft of appropriations amounting to \$3,375.79. In other words—total expenditures exceeded total appropriations by this amount. Included therein, however, was an overdraft of \$1,280.18 in the "overlay" account. Inasmuch as the town meeting does not vote the amount of overlay to be assessed, the actual net overdraft of budgetary appropriations was \$2,095.61, as shown herewith:

In accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law (Chapter 32 of the Revised Statutes Annotated) a request should have been made to the Tax Commission by the Board of Selectmen, with the approval of the Budget Committee, for a certificate of emergency authorizing expenditures made in excess of budgetary appropriations.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Pelham for their assistance during the course of the audit.





#### REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

## FOREST FIRE PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

New Hampshire faces a continuing challenge in its forest fire problem—97 percent of all our forest fires being man-caused and preventable—a serious indictment of interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbor. Both the State and the towns are striving diligently to effectively meet the challenge through education of the public to the threat fire presents to our woodlands; by maintaining a well-trained corps of wardens and deputy wardens in every community and by providing ample opportunity for all who wish to dispose of unwanted waste materials. Carelessness and perverseness, however, continue to be the big hurdles.

Thoughtlessly discarded lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles, by hikers, hunters and fishermen; careless burning of debris during hazardous periods in dangerous locations; illegal burning; improperly extinguished debris, camp and cook fires—all result in serious loss of property, disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

To meet the challenge successfully, the state, your community and your local forest fire warden need YOUR thoughtful and cooperative effort. The rules are simple.

- 1. Don't burn at home—use your town dump and avoid all fire problems.
- 2. If you do burn, be sure to secure a written permit from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow. Permits are required for open debris fires, home incinerators, outdoor fireplaces and camp fires. Your warden is instructed to permit burning if weather conditions, site and type of burning are safe.
- 3. Be sure that all lighted material—cigars, cigarettes and matches—are completely out before discarding them. Use ash trays in automobiles.
- 4. Make certain that your debris, camp and cook fires are completely out before leaving them.
- 5. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
- 6. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.
- REMEMBER—the fire you prevent might be the one which could burn YOUR property.
- REMEMBER—FOREST FIRE PREVENTION IS EVERY-BODY'S BUSINESS and our MOST IMPORTANT UNDERTAKING.

#### STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, CONCORD, N. H.

The State Department of Health, with the cooperation of our local and State School Departments conducted a series of three Salk vaccine inocculation clinics, at which one, two, or three inocculations were given by the following doctors: Dr. Augusta Law, Milford; Dr. Thomas Walker, Concord; Doctor Paul Harkinson, Manchester, and Dr. William Garvey of Nashua.

Local women serviced the clinics, while registered nurses in the town assisted the doctors.

There were three hundred and eighteen pre-school children, six hundred and seventy (670) school children and twenty-one (21) pregnant women given inoculations of Salk vaccine at Sherburne School.

The Polio Foundation, through its March of Dimes, furnished the first Salk vaccine to State Departments throughout the United States.

#### SCHOOL WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Pelham qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the E. G. Sherburne School in said district on the 22nd day of March 1958, at 12 o'clock noon, to act upon the following subjects: The polls shall open at 12 o'clock noon and may not close earlier than 2 P.M.

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,188.50 as a Deficiency Appropriation; this sum to be made available to the School District prior to June 30, 1958. (\$4,882.50 Interest on Bonds 1957-58, \$5,250.00 payment of Principal 1957-58) (\$5,056.00 Emergency Expenditure for Drainage and Public Toilets).

- 10. To see if the School District will adopt as its school check-list the town check-list, as provided in R. S. A. 197:12a, as inserted by Laws of 1957, chapter 57; this provision to be effective for the 1959 and subsequent annual district meetings.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate, in addition to the original appropriation of \$112,252.11 for 1957-58, a sum of \$6,700.00 to make a total appropriation for 1957-58 of \$118,952.11, and to authorize the application against this appropriation of \$6,700.00 already on hand, so that no part of the \$6,700.00 shall be raised by taxation, this sum being in excess of the amount needed to meet the original appropriation for 1957-58.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

#### REPORT OF PELHAM SCHOOL BOARD

The Pelham School Board has held regular monthly meetings on the first Monday of the month; attended Budget meetings; attended Supervisory District No. 27 meetings; attended meetings with the School Building Committee, Mr. Irving W. Hersey, Architect and Mr. Adrian LaBrie, contractor, to act on problems of the new addition construction; attended meetings with the Salary Schedule Committee, as voted at the School District Meeting, March, 1957.

The board is happy to announce that the new addition to the E. G. Sherburne School is nearing completion and will be ready for occupancy in the near future. The board commends the School Building Committee, headed by Mr. John Johnson, whose devoted efforts contributed a major portion toward the realization of our common goal.

The board will re-establish the Hot Lunch Program as soon as kitchen facilities are completed.

The board organized a Salary Schedule Committee composed of three members of our faculty, budget committee member, a selectman, and a taxpayer and with our combined efforts, devised a schedule which will compensate fairly, teachers elected to our school system, on the basis of degrees acquired and experience. We established a minimum rate which compares favorably with the communities bordering our town and a set of rules and regulations to govern and enforce the Salary Schedule.

The board introduced the Rinehart Penmanship System which is periodically supervised by an authorized expert, throughout the entire system. This is a major step toward improvement in this field of education. The results, thus far, are very gratifying.

The board commends Sup't Louis Ramsay, Helping Teacher Paul O'Neil and Principal Charles Juris for efficient administration and guidance; our teachers for performing all duties prescribed by our administrators; Mrs. Anna Horskins for a first-rate health program.

We should all be proud that our problem of classroom shortage has been solved and look to the future, constantly searching for more efficient and modern educational techniques so as to offer the best facilities possible for the children of Pelham.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of the Pelham School District: It gives me pleasure to submit this, my third annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

At this time last year what Pelham was to do relative to its school housing problem was a question yet to be answered; today, your response to the challenge is fast becoming a reality. Although January had been a tentative date for occupancy of the new addition, we can at last look forward with a fair degree of certainty to be in the new classrooms in the very near future.

Pelham has every reason to be proud of its school and its teaching staff. The teachers under the leadership of Principal Charles Juris have worked conscientiously for the promotion of the best possible educational advantages for your children. Special mention should be given Mrs. Ethel Chalifoux and Miss Marcelle Chenard for the type of instruction they have been carrying on under adverse conditions in the Town Hall. If you as voters see fit to accept the proposed Salary Schedule of the Salary Committee, Pelham should be in a good position not only to hold its present teachers but to encourage more experienced teachers to its present staff. Your Superintendent is fully aware of what the proposed schedule will mean to you in dollars and cents taxwise. I am just as aware of what it must mean to your children by way of an efficient, stabilized teaching staff.

### New Teachers

Miss Dorothy Ann Baxter, B.Ed. Boston University 1957 to replace Miss Helen Garon in Grade 3 who was moved to Grade 1 replacing Mrs. Gertrude Kelley. Mrs. Kelley resigned to accept a position in Littleton, Mass. Mrs. Marie O'Neil Burns, B.A. Regis College 1957 as additional teacher of English and Corrective Reading in Grades 7 and 8. Mrs. Jane Cardwell, A.B. University of New Hampshire 1957 to replace Mrs. Mildred Bertrand Grade 5, who resigned to accept a position in Littleton, Mass. Miss Marcelle Chenard, B.A. Rivier College 1957 to replace Mrs. Lola Ryan in Grade 6, who resigned to go to California with her family. Mrs. Dorothy McNulty, Sargent School, Boston University 1930 and Lowell Teachers College as an additional teacher in Grade 4. Miss Isabelle Southard, B.Ed. Keene

Teachers College 1950 to replace Mrs. Sally Battles in Grade 2, who resigned to accept a position in Dracut, Mass.

#### LOOKING AHEAD

You will note in the budget that there is provision for three additional teachers for 1958-59. This again reflects the growth in pupil enrollment in next year's grades 4 and 7 and 8. The third additional teacher in grades 7 and 8 would be to replace Mr. Juris, thereby releasing him from teaching duties and making him a full time supervising Principal. Pelham will have a fifteen classroom building next year and no Principal can do justice to his job either as teacher or administrator if he has to teach as well as administer a building that size. By releasing Mr. Juris for full time administration he can devote his time to setting up and coordinating an expanded activities program, have time to work with his teachers in developing a wider educational program and at the same time take care of the many details that go along with a school of Pelham's enrollment and size. I believe the program is necessary if you are to realize the full value of your investment.

#### REPAIRS AND REPLACEMENTS

The renovation of the old building as part of the total construction program has solved many of the needs for maintenance in that area. I will only say here that your School Board is carrying on with its practical plans for keeping the building in good repair. Minor repairs are taken care of immediately while major repairs become a part of the summer maintenance program

#### ANITORS

We were fortunate in hiring a man of Mr. Paradis' experience and background to replace Bill Burnham when Bill decided to leave for other work last fall. I feel it only proper to express my appreciation to Bill for his efforts in the past, and to Mr. Paradis for the efficient way in which he has taken on the many duties that must necessarily be part of a custodian's job.

#### Instruction

The news of John McGrath's appointment to the faculty of State University Teachers College, Potsdam, New York, was received with sincere regret. We were fortunate in finding a man experienced in elementary education with a Master's Degree in both elementary and secondary education to replace John as Helping Teacher. Mr. Paul L. O'Neil, former Principal of the Amherst Street School in Nashua has been serving in his new capacity as Helping Teacher since September 30, 1957. Mr. O'Neil's approach to his new position has been most gratifying to your Superintendent, and we are continuing with our plans to strengthen our educational program on a systematic basis. As Mr. O'Neil's report on instruction follows, I shall only say that I have every confidence he will carry on the good work.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, to Mr. Juris and the teachers for their cooperation, also to you, the citizens, for your unselfish interest in the welfare of Pelham's young people. One can't help but experience a feeling of satisfaction when he realizes he is a member of the team.

## **HELPING TEACHER'S REPORT**

Pelham, New Hampshire February 1, 1958

Mr. Louis L. Ramsay Superintendent of Schools Supervisory Union No. 27 c/o Hudson, New Hampshire Dear Sir:

My annual report as Helping Teacher for Supervisory Union 27 is submitted herewith.

A Helping Teacher strives for improved coordination of the instructional program within a school system. He must be prepared to interpret the goals of this program to the community.

I am pleased with the accomplishments noted in my numerous visitations to the classrooms of Pelham. We must keep in mind, at the outset, that any noteworthy accomplishments depend upon the ability and character of the teachers. Your superintendent and school board have staffed the classrooms of Pelham with competent teachers. They have kept your interests in mind in so doing. It is certainly a pleasure to work amidst such a professional group.

The residents of Pelham, I know, take a keen interest in their



among the children. It certainly is a healthy sign, for when a child is interested in school he does his best to succeed.

As a footnote to this preface may I add that I am very happy in my position here and pledge to do all in my power to give the children—YOUR CHILDREN—the kind of education that both the school and the community want for them.

#### ELEMENTARY EDUCATION—GRADES I-VI

Much has been written lately about methods, procedures, techniques, results of teaching reading. Many of these attacks were unfounded and illogical. I do think, however, that they served at least one purpose, intended or otherwise, that of awakening the public and certain educators to the intracacies of teaching reading. We have focused our attention on the teacher's role in the reading area and have come to a full realization of the responsibilities involved. We, as adults, should keep in mind that no two children are capable of progressing academically or otherwise in a like manner. Our Scott-Foresman series of basic readers partly assures us that the children will be met at their own level and speed. I use the word "partly" in the above sentence for indeed the teacher must give us assurance here also. Three reading groups, three separate sets of the reading books used by every classroom, as is the case in Pelham, coupled with an energetic, conscientious teacher make for a program in reading that can be matched with the best. Flexibility in grouping within each grade is a must. Constant appraisal of the child's ability in his group on the part of the teacher and other school personnel tends to make the area of reading an activated one rather than stagnant. A reading series such as ours bites a hole from our budget and undeniably omits the purchase of supplemental reading matter. Our classrooms need libraries. The teachers have been aware of this as have your school board and superintendent. Budgetary demands disallow this expenditure. Civic and fraternal organizations could come to the aid of the school in this time of need by sponsoring "book nights" or "book fairs" aimed at furnishing the children with recent literature of value and interest to their classroom work. Our school needs a central library containing reference materials suitable for all levels. The faculty would get

much use from a professional library of their own. Many new books have been published on methods and techniques of teaching the content area.

The Silver Burdett series of basic arithmetic is used in all grades. This is a highly recommended series and provides a fresh and interesting as well as meaningful approach to the teaching of arithmetic. The publishers of this particular text makes available(free of charge) the services of arithmetic consultant. This year and in years to come we will avail ourselves of the services of this specialist so that teachers, in meeting with her annually, may discuss their problems and learn of recent approaches to the teaching of arithmetic.

The language arts is an over-crowded content area but we can be certain that the teachers are performing their tasks diligently. Consider the content of the language arts and you will realize its scope-reading (and associated skills) poetry, vocabulary, dictionary usage, phonics, choral speaking, literature, and dramatics, these and several more constitute a well rounded program. I have observed many of these specific areas being taught in Pelham by teachers who have prepared careful plans and procedures. From time to time I will implement the teacher's plans with duplicated bulletins to give impetus to several of the language arts. Already distributed to individual teachers are the following bulletins, "Suggested Written Language Techniques," "Suggestions to Improve Neatness on Written Work," "The Use of Homonyms," "One Hundred Spelling Demons," "Phonics in Grades I and II." Frequent grade level meetings of all supervisory union teachers are in progress currently. A Helping Teacher's Newsletter is the monthly bulletin originating from this office. Distributed to all school personnel, its purpose is multi-fold; Condensing noteworthy professional articles, exchanging ideas and information, reporting pertinent data to supervisory union personnel, and special announcements of concern to teachers all these serve to strengthen our relationship as professional people.

Through the efforts of several teachers and administrators a newly adopted series of science books provides an interesting approach to the teaching of science—learning by doing—by Allyn and Bacon Company. This series could not have come at a more opportune moment. Parents can help the schools in this

nation-wide emphasis on science by directing steady attention of how and girls toward such valuable, instructional, and enter-

taining programs on television as, "World and Physics," "Science and Scientists," "Wide, Wide World," "Junior Science," "Mr. Wizard," to mention a few.

My affiliation with several national professional organizations provides me with numerous monthly periodicals containing provocative articles of keen interest to teachers. These are routed to every teacher's desk in the supervisory union providing the teacher with an opportunity to keep abreast of her chosen profession. These periodicals include:

The Elementary School Principal

The Math Teacher (secondary)

Annually the Pelham School administers a valuable testing program. In the fall the California Tests of Mental Maturity are given. A school-wide achievement test is administered in the spring. The results of these tests are recorded on a pupil's permanent school record by teachers. These tests are used for guidance purposes by school personnel. They afford teachers the opportunity to earmark student strengths, weaknesses. I strongly recommend continuation of this testing program and eventually making use of other standardized testing devices.

Audio visual aids are utilized in Pelham classrooms. We need to equip our school with additional film strips and make wider use of film rentals. The new addition will provide facilities for an auditorium making such a worthwhile technique readily available.

The physical education program would be worth considering once the gymnasium is complete. We need to be thinking of acquiring the services of an instructor in physical education in all grades, 1 through 8, in Pelham in the near future.

A report of this nature would be incomplete if we omitted the valuable opinion of the principal, Mr. Charles Juris, who, as you well know, always has the interest of the children, their teachers and parents in mind in his every action.

## Principal's Report—E. G. Sherburne School, 1957-58

"In order to stable further the curriculum of the E. G. Sherburne school the Rinehart Handwriting System was adopted. Under this system direct supervision is given to the primary and intermediate grade teachers monthly by a Rinehart supervisor. The unification of a directly supervised system of handwriting will prove extremely beneficial when one considers that results are already becoming apparent.

On the junior high school level the English program was enlarged by the addition of two important courses. Both of these courses center about the reading program.

The role of the reading program in the public schools today is one of vital importance. It is an area where extreme emphasis is placed on the development pattern of all the youngsters. The intensity which takes place in grades one thru six, becomes moderate in the exploratory junior high school years.

In order to do credit to the important first six years the junior high enlarged its curriculum to cope with the needed demand of furthering the elementary reading program.

A Developmental Reading class allows the school to develop a child slightly deficient in his reading level while enriching his scope of reading. More special attention is given to the reading skills, for this class will not become involved directly with the Language Arts program.

The second course offered is the Reading for Improvement class which meets twice a week to assist those at least one year deficient in their reading level. It is hoped that such a program as this carried over a two-year span will lift many youngsters up to their reading level."

Our Art program, capably supervised by Mrs. Regenia P. Milliand Mrs. Mrs. Mrs. Matthews reports herewith:

"The main objective of the Art Program are the development of imaginative and creative ability, the encouragement of each child's love of beauty and the greater use of his artistic judgement in his daily life.

An attempt was made to give the children experience and training in a variety of media so that special talents might be recognized and encouraged.

The children worked with crayons, cut paper, poster and finger paint. Some very excellent work was produced in the course of the year.

They had lessons covering problems in perspective, picture composition, figure drawing, color harmony, lettering, design and textile stencilling.

I wish to express my appreciation to all those who have cooperated so splendidly in making this a successful art year."

## Miss Teresa Grace—Music Teacher reports:

"During this period of intense scrutiny for our curriculum and high praise of Russian utilitarian education, it behooves us to look closely at such school subjects as music. Since the basic philosophy of our way of life is the importance and well-being of the individual as contrasted to the non-entity totalitarian state, there can be no comparison. We believe that music is a beneficial agent for making life more satisfying and can be of importance in developing the child's attitudes and emotions.

Believing that true appreciation can be best attained through active participation, we have endeavored to give every child a place in the music program.

Believing also that accomplishment is an important factor in determining and developing interest we start music reading in the second grade and continue through the fifth grade.

Due to the splendid cooperation of the grade teachers our intermediate grades are singing and enjoying two and three part harmony.

Starting with simple folk dances in the primary grades, we

progress to square dancing, not for entertainment, but as a means of developing the child's quick thinking and self-control.

Developing the child's voice so that he sings correctly is the major problem in the primary grades. It is gratifying to note that our percentage of poor singers is decreasing.

In looking over this report you will notice, we didn't have too many contagious diseases during the year but we did have colds, sniffles, and respiratory ailments during the winter months. In September we had a Salk Polio Clinic and 332 children and

inoculated 459 children and adults. I would like to thank all who helped to make these clinics possible under the supervision of our state nurse, Mrs. Marie Fahey, R.N.

Mrs. Catherine Hammond, our speech teacher comes to Pelham every Tuesday morning to help our defective speech pupils.

Three children were taken to Orthopedic Guidance and Nerve Clinics during the year.

In November we gave the T. B. Patch Test to the first, fifth and eighth graders under the supervision of Mrs. Irene Birchall, R.N. Two children and 3 adults were X-rayed and found free of T. B.

We had our "Registration and Get Acquainted Day" for the incoming first graders in May and 42 children attended. The P. T. A. mothers helped transport them home at noon.

Several generous people helped provide glasses, clothing and free lunches for some of our needy pupils. The Grange provided lollipops at the Salk Polio Clinics, the Police Department gave a generous check for free lunches and the P. T. A. provided for milk. I would like to thank all these for their generous help and also Mr. Ramsey, Mr. McGrath, the Principal and Teachers, the Parents, and all who contributed to the welfare of the children.
