SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

January 31, 1961

Board of Selectmen Pelham, New Hampshire Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Pelham for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1960, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Cemetery Trust Committee, Library and Municipal Court.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1959—December 31, 1960: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1959 and December 31, 1960, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Surplus increased by \$21,737.53 in 1960.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1960, are presented in Exhibits A-3⁷and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net revenue surplus of \$6,584.58, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$12,084.85, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$18,669.43.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1960, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1960, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit I)

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1960, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

It is noted that the current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities), increased by \$18,737.53, from \$13,822.87 to \$32,560.40 in 1960, as shown herewith:

Surety Bond of Town Clerk:

The surety bond of the Town Clerk should be increased from \$2,000 to \$4,000, in order that the amount of the bond may be proportional to the amount of funds received by this official.



REPORT OF PELHAM PLANNING BOARD

Regular meetings of the Board were held on the first Monday of each month, along with several special meetings. Attendance by citizens at these meetings was very small. The Board feels that more active participation by townspeople would assist its efforts in planning orderly town development and would like to see more interest demonstrated this year.

On March 7, 1960, after a Public Hearing the Board amended the Land Subdivisions Regulations by requiring that all roads constructed in subdivisions be paved with mix-in-place to a width of twenty feet. To assist the town in gaining compliance with this requirement, the Board further voted on April 18, 1960, that builders and contractors must post a bond or provide other financial guarantees to the town that roads will be properly finished before being turned over to the town prior to the Board granting approval for building.

The Board was also instrumental in securing for the town the services of a civil engineer to survey developments upon request, to determine conformance to Ordinance for layout of streets, drainage and sewer disposal. In this connection numerous inspection visits were made during the year by Board members to subdivisions under construction.

Following two public hearings, a special Town Meeting was held on August 2, 1960, to amend the Residential Section of the Town Zoning Regulations to permit the construction of golf courses and television transmitters in residential areas following petition for a variance from the Board of Adjustment.

The Planning Board, in cooperation with the Industrial Commission, prepared an advertisement for insertion in the annual publication of the Merrimack Valley Region Association presenting a concise but complete description of the town's facilities. This is in furtherance of our joint efforts to promote and publicize to small industry and business, the assets offered by our town and the benefits and advantages available to them by locating here.

REPORT OF INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION

The Pelham Industrial Commission, during the year 1960, visited with members of several Industrial Commissions in some of the border cities in the State of Massachusetts in an effort to learn what other communities are doing to successfully attract industry to their area.

Eleven industrial firms, known to be considering relocation, were interviewed in an attempt to persuade them to relocate in the Town of Pelham, N. H. In four cases they had already committed themselves to other areas. In each case they had been granted special tax abatements, or low rentals, or other monetary savings. The remaining seven firms gave indication that they had been contacted and made aware of these financial aids being offered, and it was their intention to investigate these areas first.

In the forthcoming year it is the intent of the Commission to concentrate on devising ways in which to permit the township to be able to offer some aid to these firms. Coincidentally with this problem it will be necessary to concentrate on finding new firms contemplating relocation and assisting them to a favorable consideration of our town.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

During the ten-months period, April 1, 1960, through January 31, 1961, the Board of Adjustment met fourteen times to consider twenty appeals. Of this number, nineteen were appeals for variances and one was for an exception.

The ten month totals show that seven variances were granted and twelve variances were denied. The one exception was granted. Percentagewise, 40% of the appeals were granted and 60% were denied.

Although the regular monthly meeting of the board is scheduled for the second Monday of each month, two meetings were held during the months of April, May and June to eliminate the back-log of appeals resulting from the passage of the Zoning Ordinance of January, 1960. In addition, a second meeting was held during the month of December to alleviate a hardship situation.

More than two hundred man-hours were expended collectively by the members of the board, a substantial portion of which were expended by the Clerk, exclusive of the numerous phone calls, sidewalk chats, field trips to the applicants' property, etc.

There were 31 building permits issued for new construction at a total cost of \$471,550.00, and 15 permits issued for additions or alterations at a total cost of \$13,825.00. The above costs are based on application statements.

There were 9 building and zoning violations inspected and resolved without recourse to court action.

The above statistics cover the period from August 2, 1960, through December 31. 1960, which covers the term served by the present temporary Building Inspector in 1960.

CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

For Year Ending December 31, 1960

During the year 1960, Pelham has participated in two state-wide Test Alerts. Pelham C. D. units participated in the country-wide alert practice tests on May 3rd and police, fire and medical units responded to the test alert. Traffic was brought to a standstill for 15 minutes and school children were detained at the class-rooms where their teachers explained the purpose of the C. D. test alert.

December 7th was designated as National Civil Defense Day and a state-wide telephone alert was sent out and sirens sounded the All Clear signals. All units in Pelham were advised of a meeting by mail and thru the newspapers and a Yellow Alert was sounded 30 minutes before the meeting was scheduled. The response by townspeople was far from encouraging to your Director. With 1200 registered voters and approximately 2600 residents, we were only able to draw 21 persons to the meeting. At a time when world tensions are at an all time high, when submarines are on patrol with missiles armed with atomic warheads, when our Strategic Air Command is continuously in the air with atomic warheads, and our aircraft carriers are patroling the waters to the south of us, it would seem that more than 1.7% of our registered voters would be concerned about Civil Defense.

There is much to be done if we are going to be prepared to face a civil emergency with men and women who are trained in ways and means of protecting the lives of our residents plus any evacuees that may be directed to Pelham. Volunteers are needed for all Civil Defense units. We must prepare to SURVIVE an atomic blast OR prepare to needlessly DIE.

All units need equipment to work with and your Director with the limited funds available in 1960 has attempted to secure as many low cost items as possible. We have procured thru the Surplus Properties Program the following items:

We also have a supply of 30 army cots stored at the fire station that were purchased by the previous director.

Requests are presently pending for a panel truck, suitable for rescue work, and a power generator of a minimum of 5000 watts capacity which would supply emergency power for the Fire, Police and Civil Defense headquarters, and would have sufficient power to blow the siren.

Under the Federal Matching Funds program certain articles can be purchased with the Federal Government paying half the purchase price providing the Town meets the minimum required standards. Requests are presently pending for additional radio equipment for both Fire and Police networks.

All items purchased by your C. D. Director must be available for a civil emergency, however, it is expected that each item purchased can be and should be used for any town activity for which the item has a value. For example, the dump truck can be used by the C. D. units or by the Town under the direction of the Selectmen for any Town purpose provided only that the truck is kept in serviceable condition

and with the further provision that if the truck is no longer of value to the town we would have to follow our federal practice of disposing of surplus properties.

Our Auxiliary and Regular Police units have shown a great deal of interest and have responded to all test alerts and meetings and have their units staffed. Eleven persons from this group will take the C. D. Police Training course in Exeter in February, 1961. Several of the local Police have joined the National Rifle Association and have qualified as rifle men at the Wakefield National Guard rifle range using military rifles.

Civil Defense offers a wide variety of services and your special talents can be put to good use in one of our many C. D. units. Both male and female volunteers are needed to serve on the following units:

At the present time we have some men listed as chairman of two of the above units and have thus accepted a greater responsibility than we should ask of any one person. Many of the above units are not manned at all. Pelham has a lot of catching up to do if we are to be staffed, trained, prepared and ready to survive a civil emergency. With the support of YOU, the Townspeople of Pelham, this can be done. Without your support the task will be impossible. We would not be able to transport your children safely from school; provide adequate first aid facilities; test you—your water—your food—your livestock—for radiological dangers caused by fall-out; protect your home from looting; provide an emergency supply of food, fuel, and other essential items; put out your fires; repair roads or bridges or public buildings; direct flow of traffic thru town; bury the dead; maintain health standards; rescue persons from collapsed buildings; provide essential transportation, or take care of your religious needs.

Volunteer your services to the Civil Defense Director or to your Selectmen today. LET'S PREPARE TO SURVIVE.

EACH FAMILY SHOULD PREPARE IN THEIR OWN HOMES FOR SURVIVAL. It is estimated that families might well have to be completely dependent upon their own resources for a period of two weeks. You would probably be without electricity and in most cases this means the loss of heating and cooking facilities. You should be prepared to seek shelter in a protected area which will minimize the effect of a blast and fallout following the blast. Regulation Civil Defense Shelters are the best means of protection. The next best would be an unexposed corner of your cellar or inside corridors within your home. All fires should be extinguished and fuel supply shut off at its source during a yellow or red alert. Make up a list of essential survival items and make sure all items are available at all times and in plentiful enough supply to last for two weeks. You would need food, clothing, bedding, cooking facilities, water, sanitary facilities, a battery powered radio, amusement for the children, first aid supplies, your Bible and other religious aids, matches, means of providing light, and I'm sure if you plan your survival needs you would add several more items to this list.



KNOW YOUR AIR RAID

WARNING-YELLOW ALERT-A steady 3 to 5 minute blast on siren.

Special Instructions

Do not use your telephone.

Tune your radio to CONELRAD Station (640 or 1240 kc).

Stock and prepare your shelter.

TAKE COVER—RED ALERT—Wailing tone or short blasts on siren.

Special Instructions

Go to your shelter immediately and stay there until you get word to come out. If no shelter is available seek out the best possible cover. A bomb is expected to explode within 10 minutes,

ALL CLEAR—30 second blast on siren followed by two minutes of silence.

Special Instructions

Danger of bomb blast is over. Follow instructions on Conelrad (640 or 1240 kc).

Principal cases investigated during 1960 involved waste disposal problems and well locations. State Law provides that all waste disposal must be carried away underground in a manner that is not offensive. No new disposal system may be installed less than 75 feet from any well without special permission from your health officer.

Sanitary water analysis of local swimming areas was made by the State Department of Health and with the exception of Beaver Brook all areas met with minimum standard for swimming water. Beaver Brook showed a heavy bacterial contamination in two separate tests which may have been due to farm land run-off.

Notice was sent to the owner of one public swimming area of the requirement that a second toilet be provided.

Boarding home licenses were issued for 12 foster children to be boarded in the Town of Pelham. Three homes were checked by your Health Officer for the Department of Public Welfare as a result of applications for foster children.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham in the County of Hillsborough [L. s.] in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the E. G. Sherburne school "cafetorium" in said Pelham on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects. The polls will open at 10 a.m. and close no earlier than 6 p.m. The tentative date for the business meeting is Thursday, March 16, 1961 at 7:30 p.m.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same, that is, if the Town will vote to accept the Town Budget as prepared by the Budget Committee and to take action thereon.
- 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen, or a majority thereof, and Town Treasurer to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$701.91 as the Town's share of Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$4,679.41 as the State's share, as provided by law.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to add to the Capital Reserve Fund, for the purpose of purchasing a fire truck, or take any other action relative thereto.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to transfer any unexpended balance of the Fire Department appropriation for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1961, to the Capital Reserve Fund, for the purpose of purchasing a fire truck, or take any other action relative thereto.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,240.17 for the payment of the balance due the State Tax Commission for the revaluation of all Town properties as voted by the Town at the 1958 Town Meeting, or take any other action relative thereto.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of continuing the use of the State Tax Commission in appraising new properties, or take any other action relative thereto.
- 9. To see if the Town is in favor of adopting the law to provide a pension for firemen, police officers and constables, or take any other action relative thereto.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 payable \$50.00 monthly as a pension to retiring Police Chief Arthur H. Peabody, or take any other action relative thereto (by petition)
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to approve an annual salary of \$4,500.00 for the Chief of Police as provided for in the budget, or take any other action relative thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town of Pelham will vote to have the term of office of the Chief of Police to run for a term of three years instead of one year to take effect upon passage, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition)
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to amend Article II of the Building Regulations of the Town of Pelham by deleting said Article II and inserting therein a new Article II reading as follows:
- ARTICLE II. No building construction shall be started; no alterations of existing buildings of an estimated value of more than \$150.00 undertaken; and no building shall be put to any different use than on the day of enactment of this by-law until a permit thereof has been issued under the terms of this by-law.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to amend Article III General provisions of the Zoning Ordinance for the Town of Pelham by adding after section 6 the following new section 7 reading as follows:
- 7. The removal of sod, loam, clay, sand, gravel, or other natural inorganic material from any premises is allowed in instances when such removal is (1) incidental to the lawful construction or alteration of a building or structure, or the lawful construction of a way (including driveway), on the portion of the premises where removal occurs; or (2) incidental to the construction or operation of public works by the Town or the State at the location where the removal occurs. Otherwise, the removal of such materials or any of them from any premises in any District is prohibited except that such removal may be authorized by the Board of Adjustment by special permit in any instance where the Board determines that the removal

will be advantageous to the premises in question or to the neighborhood or otherwise desirable and will be of such character and can be so accomplished that by proper re-grading, re-loaming, re-seeding or other means which shall be required, assure that the premises will be left in sightly condition and protected against crosion. The Board may in its discretion prescribe requirements as to the removal of material and to the manner in which the premises are left after said removal. The Board in its discretion may require that the applicant post a bond or other security acceptable to the Treasurer of the Town, with the Treasurer of the Town in an amount approved by the Board as sufficient to guarantee conformity with the Board's requirements.

- 15. To see if the Town will vote to amend Article III General Provisions of the Zoning Ordinance for the Town of Pelham by adding after section 7 the following new section 8 reading as follows:
- 8. There shall be constructed on each lot not more than one building for dwelling purposes.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to restrict admittance to Town Meetings to only those persons whose names appear on the voter's check list, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition)
- 17. To see if the voters will vote to restrict expenditure of allocated departmental funds in excess of \$300.00 for equipment or services except by sealed bid. This includes accumulative expenditures of like material or services within the fiscal year, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition)
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to restrict voting on all articles in the Town Warrant, except the article pertaining to town budget, to secret ballot, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition)
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to require that hereafter at all regular and special Town Meetings, all proposed new appropriations in excess of \$500.00 in any existing or prior appropriations, be individually and separately itemized, separately and individually warned in the town warrant and placed upon the regular town voting ballot (sometimes called the "Australian ballot") to be separately and individually voted on by voters of the town on such ballot, and to take any other action relative thereto. (by petition)

- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,150.00 for the purpose of gravelling and tarring or applying other asphalt mix or blacktop surface on Garland Lane, so called, for a distance of approximately 2-10 of a mile commencing at Currier Road, and running easterly to the F. A. Garland Homestead, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition)
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,700.00 for the purpose of gravelling and tarring Le-Blanc Road, so called, for a distance of 4-10 of a mile commencing at the East Dracut (New Hampshire, Massachusetts line) to Wharf Road, so called, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition)
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the purpose of tarring or applying other asphalt or blacktop surface on Spaulding Hill Road, so called, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition)
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 for the purpose of gravelling and tarring Rita Avenue, so called, and Tina Avenue, so called, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition)
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the purpose of oiling or tarring or otherwise paving Livingston Road, so called, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition)
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,330.00 for the purpose of tarring or otherwise paving Albert Street, so called, and Roberts Street, so called, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition)
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purpose of grading and improving the Lane Road, so called, on the east side of the Mammoth Road from said Mammoth Road to the Tallant Road, so called, so that it would be suitable for travel by motor vehicles, and especially to fill in the road near the Tallant Road in the vicinity of the gravel pit. (by petition)

- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to be expended in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Commission for the opening and maintaining of trails and old roads for forest fire protection. The New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Commission to provide a matching sum not in excess of \$25.00 for this purpose.
- 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

It would seem impossible to summarize all of the Selectmen's activities during 1960 within reasonable limits of space.

The graphs in this report comparing 1950 and 1960 should give some idea of Pelham's growth. In keeping with the growth of the Town the Selectmen feel it is necessary to have the Selectmen's office open two days a week, on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10 a.m. to noon, and 1 to 3 p.m.

The Selectmen thought of having the pupils of the E. G. Sherburne School compose ideas, one of which was selected for the cover of the Town Report. It was indeed a hard task to choose the drawing with the most originality. The sketch selected was drawn by Miss Lynda Wales, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Royal Wales of Mammoth Road, who is a seventh grade student. It depicts four of the units which serve our town, mainly, Library, School, Church, and Fire-Police.

The Selectmen met with the Selectmen from the Towns of Hudson, Salem and Windham, N. H. to perambulate the town lines in accordance with the State Statutes.

During the next year the Selectmen plan to give considerable thought to using a portion of the downstairs of the Town Hall for Town Officers' rooms. This move seems inevitable due to the growth of the Town.

The Selectmen feel that the continued assistance of the State Appraisers is necessary in keeping new properties and physical changes in existing properties in line with the revaluation of 1959.

In closing, we wish to acknowledge the complete cooperation of all town officials, departments and boards, and townspeople, and express our sincere gratitude for their efforts.

PREVENTION IS YOUR BUSINESS

Carelessness, HUMAN CARELESSNESS, causes 9 out of 10 forest fires. Each year 200,000 fires burn over 30 million acres in the United States. This represents 5 percent of our nation's woodlands being wasted each year. Every fire takes its toll. Floods follow; stream flow is affected; timber, buildings, grazing and wildlife are destroyed—all because MANY are CARELESS with fire in and near woodland. This can be remedied. YOU can put an end to this shameful waste! PREVENTION is YOUR business!

YOU, whether YOU be a farmer, homemaker, business or professional man or woman, municipal, state or federal official, clerk or woodsman can play an important part in the continuing and vital prevention program.

First—by setting a good example YOURSELF—being sensible and complying with the necessary laws and regulations governing the use of fire in and near .wood-lands

Second—by using YOUR individual influence in your community and valued council with others in insisting and encouraging them to do likewise.

The following simple rules may be used as a guide both for YOU and for them.

- Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden—the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning—don't leave it.
- 3. Make certain your fire, camp or debris, is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
- Don't throw down lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes or from moving vehicles—make sure they are out—use your ash tray.
- Don't burn at home—use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTELS

Taxpayers, please notice! The Librarian's proposed salary has risen from \$500.00 to \$1,075.00. The amount spent for books has risen from \$400.00 to \$900.00. There are two general reasons. There has been a terrific increase in the town's population, and the mounting demand by students for books on foreign affairs and sciences, due to increased educational requirements, and their own interest in this atomic age.

In the past 10 years, the population has increased two and one-half times, circulation—three hundred times, and the amount spent for books is about double. The amount spent for books compared to ten years ago may be doubled, but that proportionate rise means nothing in keeping up with the town's growth, and the increased educational needs, as the cost of books has doubled.

Last year, the library was open 6 hours per week, but the librarian's work does not cease when the doors close. Cards have to be removed from the files, replaced in the books returned, and the books put on the proper shelves (the State books separately). A list is made of the type of circulation for that day—fiction, non-fiction and children's books. These facts will be needed in a yearly report to the State Library—a \$500.00 fine if that report is not made. Therefore, it usually means an additional two hours for every two hours that the library is open due to the increased volume of books being borrowed.

The librarian plans on taking home five books per week to repair, put on plastic jackets, and prepare for cataloguing (one hour per book is the average).

There are book review meetings held, with other town librarians, about four times a year. She attends these meetings; and because of her attendance, the State Library awards free books to the Pelham Town Library.

The Bookmobile arrives every three months. The librarian helps to carry in this town's allotted limit of 500 books. She obtains more whenever she can successfully coax and plead her need from the State Librarian. She knows, due to the low town budget for books, that even 500 books are still not enough. This means an additional eight hours work, plus a previous day's work in assembling in alphabetical order for removal, more than 500 books from the previous visit of the bookmobile. Her limited salary does not allow any payment for this time.

The other donations were made to this town by the librarian. There was a sum of about \$200.00 for cataloguing. It was estimated \$100.00 for the file boxes and \$100.00 for her hours on this work. The cost of materials came to \$200.00. She sacrificed her pay to obtain the materials—that means \$100.00 worth of cataloguing donated last year.

Mrs. Crossley has also been transporting back and forth for the past three years' her own aged typewriter. There is no reimbursement for this, but surely this year the town should finally see the need for purchasing a typewriter for her.

started the family plan allowing all families with four or more children to eat at reduced rates, which has proved to be very satisfactory. Since September we have served 23,622 meals to children, of which 730 have been at reduced rates and 487 free, as well as 1262 meals to adults. At the present time we are serving approximately 60% of our pupils and hope to feed an even larger percentage before the end of the year.

The Cafeteria workers have served lunches for Town Meetings and Elections as well as the School Boards of District No. 27. We served our Annual Turkey Dinner for the entire school at Thanksgiving and many thanks to the volunteers who are always standing by with willing hands. The success of our lunch program is exemplified through the cooperation of the School Board, staff, parents and workers,

REPORT OF TEACHERS' SALARY COMMITTEE

The Committee appointed by the Moderator to investigate teachers' salary schedules (as per vote of the School District last year) held three meetings.

We received information from several surrounding towns. Their salary schedules range from \$3,900 to \$5,300 for the current year, with increments ranging from \$150 to \$200.

Pelham's salary schedule range is from \$3,800.00 to \$5,300.00 with increments of \$150 per year. Adjustment increments are being made in order to place all teachers on their proper salary level.

We are in the unfortunate position of having to compete with nearby Massachusetts towns for teachers. Their minimum salary according to State Law must be at least \$4,000 for the current school year.

It is our opinion that the salaries, both local and general, are undergoing a constant upward trend, and that it is a condition that is going to continue. In order to keep abreast of salaries, we are going to have to think about changes in the salary schedules.

As you can see by this report, we have more cases of mumps this year than we have had for a number of years. As in previous years we had numerous colds and virus upsets.

Mrs. Catherine Hammond, our speech teacher is a help to our pupils with speech defects and has a class every Tuesday morning. The corrected pupils are discharged and the new first graders with speech defects are admitted every September.

We had three adult evening polio clinics, one in October with 107 attending, one in November with 116 attending and the third one in May with 87 attending. In November we also had a clinic for the school and pre-school children. 233 school children, 37 pre-school children and 24 adults took this opportunity to get their third or fourth inoculation for polio, 11 pre-school children were vaccinated for small pox. These clinics were under the supervision of our State Health Nurse, Mrs. Marie Fabey, R.N., Dr. Oscar Burns of Milford, N. H., local nurses and clerks helped make these clinics a success.

In April we also had a pre-school clinic for all children entering school in September. Forty-six children attended and were given a physical examination by Dr. Marshall of Nashua, N. H., a dental examination and a free tooth brush by a state Dental Hygenist, their eyes were checked and they were weighed and measured by the school nurses of Supervisory Union No. 27.

We gave the T. B. Patch test to 145 pupils of the first, fifth, and eighth grades and to 3 adults in April. We had 4 reactors who were X-rayed in Nashua and were found negative. These tests were given under the supervision of Mrs. Irene Birchall, R.N., State T. B. nurse.

The Salvation Army, Grange and P. T. A. aided with funds for dental care, milk and free lunches for needy pupils. Clothes and toys that were given to me helped a few families during the year.

It was a busy year and with it new problems but with everyone cooperating, it passed successfully. I want to thank all who helped in any way, doctor, nurses, organizations, parents, clerks, Mr. Ramsay, Mr. O'Neil, Mr. Juris, and the teachers for their cooperation and contributions to the welfare of our pupils.

REPORT OF SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

You will be pleased to learn that since the last annual report, the kitchen area of our school has had a face lifting. Through the combined efforts of the School Board and Budget Committee we were able to install a walk-in refrigerator and freezer. This necessitated the renovation of our storage area, which is also completed. You women will all know what a pleasure it is to work in a "new look" kitchen.

We are endeavoring to secure the children of our school the best meals possible for your money, and still meet the requirement of a Class A lunch. In November we

Sherburne School. The mainstay in the nomenclature of any school system, however, is the teaching force—who are directly on the firing line. Naturally there needs to be created a comfortable teaching climate. An atmosphere wherein every teacher, principal, and administrator is a team participant in the overall pattern.

There are several common-sense avenues of approach to the creation of a healthy working atmosphere, the best ones I know of, and the most effective, are: (1) to give the schools proper and sufficient supervision; (2) frequent conferences with teachers pointing out strengths and weaknesses noted through such supervisions;(3) planning in-service meetings or work-sessions whereby teachers become aware of newer techniques, skills, and devices, as well as to experiment with them; and, (4) kindle a continuous two-way communication through which there is channeled a steady flow of information relative to the job expectancies. These media are used most advantageously in Union No. 27 schools.

There is a well-balanced program of studies being taught. Well-established skills and techniques are introduced through the use of time-tested methods; the latter may be called traditional in a sense, but let's not forget that there are many, many good features in some older methods—yes, even in this THE NEW FRONTIER!

We are blessed with a conscientious staff of teachers who are anxious to do their utmost for the cause of educating your children. There is a balance in the staff—a balance which makes the whole scheme run like clock-work—with your children the profiteers.

THE NEW LOOK — EDUCATION FOR THE SIXTIES

I am happy to report that there are new developments and giant strides being inculcated into the curriculum. These new trends were not imposed upon your school staff from the hierarchy in the central office. These trends and new directions as well as improved methods of instruction have come from the teachers and the principal at E. G. Sherburne. Careful and thoughtful as well as time-consuming research has gone into putting these newer developments into practice.

If you were to take a tour of your school tomorrow (and remember you are always invited to do so), you might be amazed that Pelham children have so much to help them through their school life. Here are some items you have provided them:

- a. A devoted and interested faculty
- Curriculum specialists in art, music, speech therapy, health, music (instrumental), handwriting
- c. Grouping techniques being used to teach the content areas
- d. Departmentalization in the seventh and eighth grades
- e. Necessary space to carry on the many extra-curricular activities which tend to put the building to good use after school hours
- f. The beginnings of a central library—so sorely needed for a school this size
- g. Many new and supplemental textbooks, reference books, and teacher's professional volumes
- h. Increasing number of audio-visual devices
- i. An adequate standardized testing program—I. B. M.—scored to assure accuracy and help cut down the teacher's work load

These and many more have pleased me no end. I know you will share this pleasure with me.

HELPING TEACHER'S REPORT

The following paragraphs will constitute my annual report of the instructional programs in Supervisory Union No. 27—Pelham, New Hampshire—January, 1961. At the outset, I will borrow a few words from Peter F. Drucker who, in "Landmarks of Tomorrow," sheds light upon the complexities facing society today:

"... We are in the midstream today... but one thing is certain: The past is going fast. If there is one thing we can predict, it is change. The coming years will he years of rapid change in our vision, the direction of our efforts, the tasks we tackle and their priorities, and the yardsticks by which we measure success or failure."

Social change affects the values and purposes of education; to say that there is need for structural changes in education is putting it mildly.

I am sure that the townspeople of Pelham want me to deal in specifics when I discuss their school, (and let's not forget that the school in Pelham IS yours!) and the educational programs contained therein. Moreover, the people want to know if our curriculum offerings maintain a healthy balance between what we know about the teaching and learning processes. Pelham folk want to know if their school is keeping a watchful eye upon newer educational trends and developments. What is more, readers of this report will want proof that only those innovations which fit the needs of Pelham school children are considered, and ultimately put into operation. Lastly, friends of Pelham school will enjoy a review of the philosophy around which our school is functioning, for it is a sound philosophy, one that tends to keep our feet on the ground while our esprit-de-corps is high up on cloud seven.

A HEALTHY BALANCE

Critics of late have caused considerable unrest amongst educ ator groups. "Not enough of the three R's"; "Too many frills"; "More emphasis should be placed on this, or upon that"; "Schools cost too much"; "There's too little discipline in the schools"; these and many more have come to your attention I am sure. I am of the opinion that much good has come from some sincere criticism—based upon fact not fiction, unfortunately, though, many critics have not bothered to learn the truth. Since Pelham engages a professional staff consisting of a superintendent of schools, an office of assistance to him known as Helping Teacher, and a school principal, it is up to these school administrators to keep the curriculum in balance. To help them maintain this needed balance you have provided them the opportunity to meet with other school administrators to consider education's biggest problems. They have associated themselves with several organizations of a professional nature from which there is a continuous stream of information of such pertinent a nature so as to be of real value to curriculum progress at the E. G.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and citizens of the Pelham School District:

It gives me pleasure to submit my sixth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

I would like to begin this report with a commendation to you, the citizens of Pelham, for your cooperation with your School Board in their attempt to maintain a high level of instruction in the E. G. Sherburne School. A glance at the list of new teachers for school year 1960-61 gives a good idea of the success achieved in retaining teachers for 1960-61. Miss Habecker left to continue with studies for a Master's Degree while Mr. Sullivan resigned to accept a position in Massachusetts for considerable more money. It is unfortunate that the Grade 7 & 8 English program has been the one most effected by turnover in teaching staff, but you may be sure Superintendent and School Board will continue making every effort possible to acquire and maintain the best staff possible.

NEW TEACHERS

Miss Marla Dee Hildreth, B.A., Adelphia College 1959 to replace Miss Janet Habecker as teacher in combined section of Grades 5 & 6.

Joseph M. Berry, B.A., M.A., Suffolk University 1958 to replace Michael Sullivan in Grades 7 & 8. Mr. Berry resigned because of personal reasons as of January 20, 1961 and has been replaced by Mr. Bryan L. Carpenter, M.SA.Harvard 1922. Mr. Carpenter comes to us with many years of successful teaching experience in the field of English and Foreign Languages.

REPAIRS AND REPLACEMENTS

The usual program of repairs and replacements has been carried on. The hottopping of the area around the school has not only improved appearances, but has cut down noticeably on the amount of dirt carried into the school building. The finishing of the front entrance has eliminated a bad safety hazard and at the same time improved appearances. More storage space has been provided in some classrooms which tends to eliminate unnecessary clutter.

In your current budget there is an item to make extensive repairs in the four classrooms in the Junior High. This calls for fluorescent lighting in three rooms, bulletin boards, painting and the addition of more shelves for storage. This should be done as these rooms are very much in need of brightening up with improved lighting and lighter walls.

CUSTODIAN

Lorin Raymond has maintained his usual high level of efficiency in his custodial work. His cooperation and efforts in maintaining a clean and sanitary building are appreciated by all concerned.

INSTRUCTION

Under the continued excellent guidance of Helping Teacher Paul L. O'Neil and the efforts of Principal Juris and his staff of teachers, your instructional program is expanding and growing. As Mr. O'Neil will deal with specifics, I shall only say that I am happy with the results achieved and feel assured we can look forward to continued growth.

SCHOOL LUNCH

Velma Houle and her assistants are again proving that good planning and hard work can make a hot lunch program operate efficiently. The installation of the Port-a-fold tables has proven to be just as helpful as anticipated while the new walk-in refrigerator and freezer should aid materially in cutting costs through more economical buying when prices of a commodity are down.

THIS AND THAT

The All Purpose room at the E. G. Sherburne School has become a real center of community activities. Young and old alike are enjoying the advantages of the facilities it offers.

REPORT OF PELHAM SCHOOL BOARD

The School Board takes pleasure in again reporting that the School system has experienced another year of continued growth and improvement. This report will not go into great detail concerning the operation of our school system because for the most part it has been covered by staff or financial reports which are printed elsewhere. There are, however, several areas that we would like to particularly stress.

SCHOOL FINANCES. An examination of the financial reports will show that in the last year we have passed from a current deficit to a current surplus, a condition we intend to retain. This requires two essentials: The mutual cooperation of the entire school administration and adequate appropriations. The School Board has set this goal for itself in spending: to ask for the necessary money to do any particular job or project needing to be done, to spend your money wisely and conservatively in doing that job and to zealously conserve any balance left, as a surplus in the General Fund.

SCHOOL STAFF. We are pleased with the professional staff of the school and believe that it has continued to develop in capabilities and achievement. To this end the Superintendent, Helping Teacher, and Principal have worked hard and successfully. We hope that the makeup of the instructional staff has largely stabilized and will remain so. This feeling also includes the lunch program and the school janitor. Both are doing an excellent job under at times trying circumstances. We have hopes that most of the serious problems of the lunch program have been either corrected or will be in the near future.

ATHLETIC PROGRAM. To date this has seemingly, largely revolved around the boys' basketball team. It is our opinion that this is not a well-rounded program. Studies are now being made and it is our expectation that by next year a program to better meet the athletic needs of all the school can be developed.

SCHOOL BAND. After some period of drifting the Board now feels that an atmosphere of growth and development has been created. Miss Patricia O'Neil has been secured as instructor and is busily establishing a foundation for a successful band. Miss O'Neil is a graduate of Lowell Teachers College, with a major in music and is connected with the Music Department of the Westford, Mass. schools. It must be remembered that the support of this program largely comes from the fees paid by the parents of the band children but is under the supervision of the School.

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS. The education of our high school pupils has always been and continues to be a serious problem. After graduating from Junior High our pupils scatter to any public high school in the area that will take them or that they can get to. Their transportation is usually a difficult problem for their parents, as to means and also financially. We lose contact with them just at the time when they most often need encouragement to continue their education and guidance in their planning for that education. The building of a consolidated regional high school is not being advanced at this time by the state and will probably not be beyond the talking stage for some time.

In conclusion, in appraising the quality of our school system we should never be betrayed by self-satisfaction in our past accomplishments into a smug belief that we can coast on that past or turn our backs on our problems. New avenues of learning are constantly opening to the interested educator and must be explored to see if they hold anything of value for us. If we are to retain competent teachers we must maintain salaries at a level comparable with other school systems. And of more importance than any of these things, an alert and progressive school admintration and citizenry must work together in constantly demanding greater effort and greater achievement.

As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$4,748.81, plus a revenue surplus of \$1,113.56, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$5,862.37.

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1960, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1960, is indicated in Exhibit F.

Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit J)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1960, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit K)

Exhibit K presents a summarized statement of the School Tax account with the Town of Pelham. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1960, the School District had received from the Town the total amount of the 1959-60 school tax.

I herewith submit my report as Librarian of the Pelham Public Library for the year 1960. My aim is to give the best library service to everyone in the community. As our town is rapidly growing, the library hopes to grow.

It is intended to build up a well-rounded collection with a little emphasis in the juvenile department.

To celebrate National Library Week a book jacket coloring contest was held. The library supplied entertainment for the P. T. A. in October with the aid of the State Library Extension Division, supplying a large display of books in the form of a Book Fair.

A special collection of Hobbies and How-to-do-it books were on display at Pelham's Old Home Day. In November an Art and Hobby Show was held in the library. Special displays from the State Library have been on display in the library throughout the year.

We have the facilities of the Bookmobile which visits us about every three months and the State Library which fills special requests made by persons interested in a particular subject and reference books for school children and adults. Use of films, projector and book collections for programs are made available to the schools and any organization in the community. These services provide an excellent means of supplementing our own collection.

I am still engaged in cataloguing the entire collection in the library.

During July it was my pleasure and great privilege, through a scholarship awarded by the Shieling Trust Fund, to attend the University in Durham, taking my second year of a four-year course in Public Library Techniques.

I wish to express my appreciation to the many interested friends from whom the library received gifts of books, magazines, tables and seats for the small children, a display board, a unit of book shelves, and donating their time to aid the library.

I sincerely hope more people of Pelham will visit the library and make use of its many services, as it is the one non-biased information center for all the people in the community as well as an education center for children and a place where adults may continue to learn throughout their lives.

The hourly rate would drop even further if cataloguing had been included, and the hours she spent sorting out, for discard, many old books on the shelves in the attic and cellar.

The new salary proposed is based on only 3 hours work for every 2 that the library is open, plus an additional 3 hours which its has been proposed that the library be open to the public, giving the librarian an hourly pay of \$1.32 per hour. She would actually be giving many more hours for no salary.

Mrs. Crossley has acquired the equivalent of a two year college training in library technique through her attendance at the university for condensed summer courses and practical training, using directions and advice of trained state librarians.

The librarian has tried, unsuccessfully, to gain better cooperation between school and library, even offering to open special hours for the school only. Plans have been worked out in other towns such as class trips (a five minute walk) during school hours.

We, the taxpayers, should check with our school system as to the lack of cooperation, and the inability of the elementary school children to be allowed and encouraged to use the town's library facilities.

There are about 140 pupils attending high school. Many have to depend on a rigid schedule of transportation. They are often given assignments requiring library research. They have to leave that city, and go home—then appear at the town library to complete their lessons. The books should be there for their use.

All books, encyclopedias included, are graded for different ages, but there is this odd fact. A senior high school student may be assigned to gather material on a certain subject. He may actually find his best information in a younger child's junior reference book.

Therefore, it is important, even during the summer, that books of all age levels be available at all times, for all ages at the Pelham Town Library.

Many people are not aware of the fact that there is a wide variety of educational films, many at no charge, plus the free use of a projector and a trained operator, from the State Library through cooperation with the Town Library.

The policy of the State Library with which we work so closely does not advocate the use of public library funds for any library other then the Town Library. They feel the library is best equipped to handle library business.

Let us support the building that was built, primarily, for library purposes, centrally located (between two schools), and which has empty shelves awaiting an item called a "book."
