TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: Polls open 10 A. M., close 7 P. M.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pelham, on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, and as provided by law. Also to bring in your ballot on the following question:

(a) Shall the provisions of Chapter 171A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this town?

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges and make appropriations of the same. That is to see if the Town will vote to accept the Town Budget as prepared by the budget committee, and to take action thereon.

3. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$548.55 as the town's share of Town Road Aid, the State to contribute to this fund.

4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$1,500 for graveling and tarring, Webster Ave. (North Shore Road to Island Pond). Budget Committee recommends \$1,250 for this purpose.

5. To see if the Town will authorize the purchase of a Fire Truck, purchase price \$6,000 payable \$2,000 down, after one year the balance to be paid in notes of \$500 each every six months till the whole with interest shall have been paid.

6. To see if the Town will vote to acquire a better location for a town dump, and to raise and appropriate \$200 for the purchase and maintenance of the same.

7. To see if the Town will vote to invite the State Tax Commission to aid the selectmen in revaluation of the Town and appropriate money to carry the same into effect.

8. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when they make their appraisal in April.

9. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

AUDITORS' REPORT

We, the undersigned auditors of the Town of Pelham, hereby certify that we have examined the books and accounts of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Treasurer of Trust Funds, Treasurer of Cemetery Trustees, and Treasurer of Library Trustees.

We find that the Selectmen have issued orders on the Treasurer to the amount of \$93,700.95. All orders except one were cast correctly, and all were properly vouched.

We find that the Treasurer had on hand January 1, 1950, \$2,601.71. He received from all sources \$96,838.03, and has paid out \$93,701.34 leaving a balance on hand December 31, 1950 of \$5,738.40. All checks except one were drawn correctly. The difference between the Treasurer and Selectmen amounted to just \$0.39.

The Tax Collector's accounts are as follows: she had collected in taxes and interest \$54,151.85 of the 1950 levy, \$13,463.59 of the 1949 levy, and \$6.60 of the 1948 levy. All sums collected have been turned over to the Treasurer. There remains \$67.80 of the 1949 levy and \$4.00 of the 1948 levy uncollected. The Selectmen have issued tax abatements to the amount of \$407.26. The amount of the Tax Sale was \$140.35.

We find that the Town Clerk has received \$45.08 in auto permits for 1949-50 and \$3,835.41 in permits for 1950-51. These sums have been paid over to the Treasurer. He received \$576.00 in dog licenses, retained \$47.00 in fees and postage and paid the Treasurer \$529.00.

The Trust Funds amount to \$14,912.02 and the Treasurer of the Trust Funds has on hand unexpended balance of \$524.77.

The Cemetery Trustees had on hand January 1, 1950, the sum of \$122.56. They received from all sources \$524.00. They expended \$584.61, and have \$61.95 on hand December 31, 1950.

The Library Trustees had \$160.98 on hand January 1,

1950. They received \$680.15, and expended \$304.27 leaving a balance on hand December 31, 1950 of \$536.86.

The Gage Fund amounts to \$175.70.

REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE

Of its Investigation of Neighboring High Schools

The last annual School District meeting directed the School Committee to investigate the high schools of the neighboring communities with a view of learning their scholastic standing, the tuition they would charge if we signed a five year contract with them and if there would be a saving in tuition that could be applied toward the cost of transportation of our high school students.

Our findings are as follows:

The scholastic standing of each of these schools meets the requirements of the State Board of Education.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Pelham School Board:

I herewith submit my second annual report on the condition of your school.

The past year has been highlighted by the following developments: (1) A tremendous upsurge of interest in the schools by civic and fraternal organizations, (2) The first full year of occupancy of the new addition, and (3) the launching of a noon hot lunch program.

Very few school districts can boast of as much layman participation in improving the physical plant as was shown this past year. The project sponsored by the Grange seemed to be a very optimistic one when it was first started, but the results were beyond expectation and the response from all groups was very gratifying. Many hundreds of dollars would have had to be expended to obtain the same results if the work were done by contractors. All may well be proud of the entire building and feel that the work was appreciated by youngsters and parents alike.

This first year has seen the school begin to show the benefits to the children and the community a new school can and should provide. With all teachers having single grades, more individual help can be given and much enrichment of the school program is possible. The pupils and teachers are beginning to realize the greater possibilities now present and are taking advantage of them. Another year should prove to be even more rich in new experience and better teaching techniques.

A great deal of time and effort has been spent in successfully starting the hot lunch program. The fact that more than 60% of the pupils eat a hot meal at the school shows its need and its popularity. The cooperation of the women, through the P. T. A., has made this project possible. No one realized the time that your board has put into providing facilities for the kitchen. A lot of credit should also go to Mr. Smith Horskin, who has given unstintingly of his time, equipment and materials to see that many items which

could not be purchased were made and given to the school.

The effects of the present crisis in world affairs on the schools will be felt in shortages of certain supplies and possibly text books. The cost of these items will undoubtedly increase.

The biggest single effect can be expected in the form of a shortage of elementary teachers more critical than we have yet seen. Every school district should carefully consider the part that salaries play in keeping and obtaining able teachers.

The fine cooperation of the school board, teachers, and parents has made this year an enjoyable one. It is only through such cooperation that our schools can continue to improve.
