




SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

February 6, 1963

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Pelham for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Cemetery Trust Committee, Library and Municipal Court.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1961 - December 31, 1962: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1961 and December 31, 1962, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Surplus increased by \$3,417.67, from \$29,420.73 to \$32,838.40, in 1962. Inasmuch as there were no outstanding bonds or long term notes, all of the liabilities were current accounts. Therefore, the Balance Sheet Surplus of \$32,838.40, represented the Current Surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) as of December 31, 1962.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, are presented in Exhibits

A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$5,923.72, plus a revenue surplus of \$4,122.80, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$10,046.52.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Unredeemed Taxes - Prior Years:

It is noted that there are unredeemed taxes on account of the tax sales for the levies of 1959 and prior years as follows:

Inasmuch as the two year period provided for redemptions has expired on the unredeemed taxes as listed above, tax deeds should be given to the Town by the Collector for the properties represented by these tax liens.


Surety Bonds of Town Treasurer:

The surety bond of the Town Treasurer should be increased from \$15,000.00 to \$20,000.00, in order that the amount of the bond may be more proportional to the amount of funds received by and in the custody of the Treasurer.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next report of the Town.





REPORT OF INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION

The Town of Pelham has a great need for industry to help balance the growth of the town and to share the increasing tax burden. With the advent of industry will come the growth of the business community and an additional source of tax revenue for the town.

Towards this end, your Pelham Industrial Commission has been compiling and documenting statistics and facts concerning the town and the surrounding area, the results of which efforts may be seen in the Pelham Community Fact Sheet on the adjoining page. This publication was drawn up from data provided by your Commission and printed by the New Hampshire Industrial Commission, and has been distributed to all Commission members and to Industrial Information Centers throughout the United States.

Your Commission held nine meetings during the last year, two of which were held with the New Hampshire Industrial Commission at Concord and one in Pelham with Mr. Allen Chase of the New Hampshire Industrial Commission. Another meeting was also held with the County Editor of the Lowell Sun which produced a feature article on Pelham and its industrial advantages.

One new industry is in the process of moving to Pelham as a result of the Commission's activities with at least one more industry interested in our town as a site for its operation.

The Commission is continuing its activities of publicizing Pelham as an excellent location for light industry and is actively engaged in looking for industry interested in moving to this area. The help of each and every person in the Town of Pelham is requested in this endeavor. Pelham Community Fact sheets are available from Commission members and information concerning any industry contemplating relocation will be greatly appreciated.

CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

FOR YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1962

During 1962 we have completed a training course in Advanced First Aid which was taught by Leo Bongers under a Red Cross First Aid Training Program. There were approximately 15 persons graduated from this course.

Our Radef groups have met during the year and instrument checks are made at each meeting to assure that each is in proper operating condition. Reports on these checks have been made to the New Hampshire State Civil Defense Headquarters.

Our Auxiliary Police unit meets monthly and have maintained an extensive training program throughout the year. Many of the Auxiliary Police officers have full summer uniforms and have been given cruiser training under a State Program which covers them under Workmen's Compensation. They have been trained in the use of fire arms under the supervision of National Rifle Association personnel. They were trained in Military Rifle shooting at classes conducted at Balcom's sand pit and in the use of Hand Guns at the Pelham Fish and Game club's new Pistol Range.

Our new 3.5 K.W. Power Generator, 250 Gal. Propane Gas Tank and other allied equipment has been installed at the fire station. We have also installed a Base Station Receiver-Transmitter on the Forestry Band at the Fire Station. A new mobile radio was purchased by the Fire Department and installed in the new Fire Truck through Civil Defense. All of the above equipment was purchased on a Matching Funds Program which resulted in the Town's paying for only one half of the State's Discounted Purchase price.

Your Director attended a Shelter Survey Meeting at the National Guard Armory in Concord during the year and reports were given on the National Shelter program as it applies to the State of New Hampshire. Unfortunately I have been unable to get the Engineers to survey the Town with your Director. It is my opinion that there are several areas that with a little work would provide adequate shelter for 50 or more persons.

I have been advised that under Phase 3 of the Shelter Program the Corps of Engineers will contact local directors for a survey of areas that the director might point out to them. If we are able to get shelter space approved we would be able to have each stocked without cost to the Town with sanitary supplies, medical kits, Radef instruments, water and emergency food rations.

This year all Towns were required to have a new Town Plan and Program Papers approved before the Town would be eligible to buy from the Surplus Properties list

Because of this requirement and because so few of the Local Directors had their plans approved the Surplus Properties program was drastically reduced during 1962. The Town of Pelham has completed all required forms and they have been approved. Several items were purchased during the year at a fraction of their original cost.

Early in 1962 the Civil Defense program was changed from a Civilian program to a program that is presently under the control of the Department of Defense and under Military control. Many changes in procedures have resulted and new requirements have been added. There were no Nation-wide or State-wide Test Alerts during the year.

Many of our local Civil Defense divisions are lacking in manpower and your Director would welcome any volunteers who would like to help out in improving our readiness for any Civil Emergency that might take place. Our Radef and Auxiliary Police units have been active and have all had considerable training but all other groups are badly in need of manpower and training.

I wish to take this opportunity to express my thanks to all who have assisted me during the past year and also those who have taken an active part in our Civil Defense program.

This test very quickly showed seepage from the septic tank and the owner of the property was required to correct this condition.

I wish to thank Anna Horskin, School Nurse, for reporting cases of communicable diseases in the Pelham schools.

I wish to express my sincere thanks for all courtesies that were extended to me in the investigations carried out during the year.

ANNUAL REPORT FROM THE STATE NURSE

During the year of 1962 nursing visits in your town have been made for the purpose of health supervision to infants, preschool children, and adults.

Office hours are held from 8:30 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. Mon. - Fri., in the office which is located at 277 Main St., Nashua, for those who wish to talk to me. Also, contact may be made by phone at TU 2-3871.

A tri-town plan for immunization was decided upon to expedite the administration of the Sabin oral vaccine. Participating in this joint project were the towns of Hudson, Litchfield, and Pelham. Children from the ages of 6 weeks to 6 years received their "drinks" at three successive clinics under the direction of Dr. John Quigley.

In November, the first in a series of three immunization clinics was held at the local school. Immunization against Diptheria, Whooping Cough, Tetanus, Smallpox, and Polio was provided. At this time, Sabin oral vaccine was made available to the school age children. Dr. Luther March was the attending physician.

It is with deep gratitude that I express my thanks to the Doctors, the town officials, the school nurse, and the many, willing volunteers. Their cooperative effort and support were essential to the success of the health program.

It now becomes the duty of the Selectmen, Industrial Commission and the residents of the Town to foster this effort and make this store the nucleous around which a shopping center of considerable proportions is established. This is needed to help round out our tax structure and help the individual property owner tax-wise.



REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDENS

PREVENTING FOREST FIRES

IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires is New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2,200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.

If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.

Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late

in the day.

4. Have something to keep the fire under control pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.

5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.

6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to instill in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire.

REPORT OF PELHAM PUBLIC LIBRARY

The New Look has been given to the interior of our Public Library. Cracks were filled, then walls and ceilings were painted, lights were lowered, thus the combined effect with snow white ceilings not only brightens the surroundings, but aids our readers.

We were awarded a \$200.00 grant from the State which enabled us to obtain the New Webster International Dictionary. The Trustees purchased a set of new Science encyclopedias to compliment the State gift. Our aim was to strengthen the reference branch of the library.

There were few grants allowed in the State. The Trustees and Librarian were required to display a cooperative spirit. Pelham residents assisted also by voting for increased funds to purchase books. We feel that high school students will particularly benefit from these reference books.

There were about 170 high school students. We estimate that about 60 high school students are using the town library. Total public school population is 439. Approximately 15 elementary school students have been escorted to the library; after school only, via a safety patrol. The patronage of adult readers has increased by 1,000. We particularly note the high percentage of new residents visiting our library. Town teachers working in a nearby city have also used the facilities of our library.

A pamphlet file of non-book materials, supplementary current magazine articles and phamplets as yet unpublished in book form, will soon be installed. Students and the public will have access to this file. This feature will particularly aid students to give complete coverage on a particular theme.

The Library hours were extended to opening on Saturday afternoon at the request of townspeople, but attendance was very poor, consequently these hours were revoked. This year we would like to try a Tuesday night, students having made this request.

Within the coming year, we hope to complete the newly painted library by having floors refinished. We are proud that our present floors are really showing wear and tear, particularly in the reading room. Heres hoping, regardless of cost, we will have to refinish the floors many times in the future. It means townspeople are using their library.

I herewith submit my report as Librarian of the Pelham Public Library.

The modern public library of today becomes sensitive to the trends of the times and needs and interests of the community. This is what the librarian and trustees have been doing this past year, making the Pelham Public Library a modern library. A great amount of work has been involved.

It has a specially selected collection of books for children and all ages. This is a vital service, as it introduces boys and girls to the joys of reading, as well as an aid to their education. Reference and advisory services make the library an information center. Today's books for children are attractive, and are written especially for their reading levels and interests, and cover a wide range of subjects.

There are books for all ages, authoritative, currently useful, historical, as well as up to date, covering all fields of knowledge and including many kinds of nonbook materials. A basic essential of quality library service.

The library is a storehouse for wisdom and knowledge. Yet, if it is to be more than a place to shelve books, the information must be readily available. The library's card catalog is the key to this storehouse. The contents of

this storehouse of knowledge becomes available to all. Through the catalog both the reader and librarian can find a particular title, the books by a specific author, the books on any given subject, and where all books are to be found in the library.

The card catalog contains for each book in the library, an author card, a title card, a subject card, and a shelf card.

During the year I conducted an eight week Story Hour. To celebrate National Library Week a poster contest was held with five winners each was awarded a book. In July, again it was a privilege and a pleasure, through a scholarship to attend the University of New Hampshire taking, my fourth and last term in "Public Library Techniques". I graduated and received my certificate. I attended the Annual Meeting of the New Hampshire Library Association of which I am secretary, and had an active part. Attended the New England Library Association for two days, attended the New Hampshire Trustees Association Annual Meeting, attended neighborhood meetings with the trustees. These meetings have widened my knowledge of being a librarian.

The Public Library is for the public, and the public is all of us.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

The records will show that your police department has been a very busy one. Our police cruiser has been very active, with the cruiser patrol being increased from 3 nights to 4 nights a week, and from 4 hours nightly to 5 hours nightly.

The number of new homes is increasing steadily. This in turn is increasing the number of new streets and roads which have to be patrolled. As you will notice the number of complaints which had to be investigated has multiplied.

Because of limited funds available, numerous hours have been donated by our regular police and the police auxiliary. As you have probably noticed there are always two officers on night cruiser duty, as I feel no officer should be on night cruiser duty alone. We are most fortunate in having one of these men donate his time.

The Police relief association has made it possible for our department to have, with no cost to the town, boots, raincoats, heavy duty all-weather jackets, and a fingerprint kit. They have also re-lettered the police station sign and helped to defray cost of bicycle registration plates.

I would like to thank Mrs. Harriet Mansfield and Mrs. Patricia Vining for their 24 hour coverage of the police phone. We have also had quite a few hours of typing services which have been donated to the town. During this past year we were fortunate in having a Civil Defense transmitter installed in the police station which now allows us to make direct contact with our cruiser, and other police radios and fire detection facilities.

During 1963 we plan to do a complete catalog listing of streets and names of all residents and their phone numbers. It is hoped that everyone will co-operate when the request for this information is called for. This is to be done in conjunction with the fire department, and will alleviate many errors in locating persons or streets when an emergency is present.

Residents are asked to note the police department phone number of 635-2411, which is manned twenty-four hours a day.

In closing, I wish to acknowledge the cooperation of all town officials and townspeople, and express my sincere gratitude for their efforts.



REPORT OF THE PELHAM ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

This past year has been our most successful thus far in our efforts to provide the youth of Pelham with a continuing athletic and social program.

Through the interest and support of the citizens of Pelham we were able to uniform and equip four of our Little League teams and to equip four girls softball teams. Over one hundred and sixty children participated in these activities.

The highlight of our year's activities was the Fourth annual Sport-A-Rama in which approximately six hundred youngsters participated in the two days of sporting events. The climax of the Sport-A-Rama was the awarding of 348 trophies to the winners.

A monthly dance program was instituted in October for the teen age youth of the town and will continue through May.

Our future activities will encompass such projects as the improvement of recreational facilities within the town, uniforms for the girls softball teams, reactivation of an organized basketball league, the establishment of safe areas for ice skating and the improvement of existing programs and facilities.

The scope of our activities is only limited by the amount of active participation of the adult population of our community. With greater support by the adult group our program could provide activities for our children unequaled by other communities in our area.

We gratefully acknowledge the generous contributions of a local Dairy for the dairy products supplied for the Sport-A-Rama and the Inter School Trophy presented by the Reverend Kilcoyne of St. Patrick's Church.

Our gratitude is also extended to all the coaches, chaperones, persons and organizations who in any way helped to make these activities for our children possible.

- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same, that is, if the Town will vote to accept the Town Budget as prepared by the Budget Committee and to take action thereon.
- 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen, or a majority thereof, and Town Treasurer to borrow neccessary money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$714.87 as the Town's share of Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$4,765.81 as the State's share, as provided by law.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the purpose of purchasing a new police cruiser, the present police cruiser to be used as a trade-in, or take any other action relative thereto.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,350.00 for the purpose of repairing the Hobbs Road Bridge, or take any other action relative thereto.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 for the purpose of repairing the town clock, or take any other action relative thereto.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the purpose of further alterations and furnishings for the Town Hall, to make the building habitable for the use of the Town Officers, or take any other action relative thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of looking up and surveying lands owned by the Town, or take any other ac-



- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of continuing the use of the State Tax Commission in appraising new properties, or take any other action relative thereto.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 payable \$50.00 monthly as a pension to retired Police Chief Arthur H. Peabody, or take any other action relative thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to transfer any unexpended balance of the Fire Department appropriation for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1963 to the Capital Reserve Fund, for the purpose of purchasing a fire truck, or take any other action relative thereto.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 under the Parks and Playgrounds Appropriation for the purpose of improving the town common, to have it graded and seeded and landscaped, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition)
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to amend Article 1A entitled Districts, Section B of the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Pelham as amended by adding to the business district as therein defined the following area:

The business district also consists of the following additional area:

Commencing at a point at the southerly line of the intersection of Currier Road and Bridge Street (Route 38): thence northeasterly six hundred (600) feet along the south line of Currier Road; thence southerly and parallel to Bridge Street (Route 38) as is now laid out to a point on the north line of Jericho Road, said point being six hundred (600) feet easterly from the intersection of Jericho Road and said Bridge Street (Route 38); thence westerly along the north line of Jericho Road to the intersection of said Jericho Road and Bridge Street (Route 38); thence northerly by the east line of said Bridge Street to a point on the east line of said Bridge Street opposite the intersection of Suprenant Road; thence westerly crossing said Bridge Street to the north side of the intersection of

Suprenant Road and Bridge Street; thence westerly along the north bound of the Industrial District as previously laid out six hundred (600) feet; thence northerly and parallel to the west line of said Bridge Street (Route 38) to a point opposite the southern intersection of Old Bridge Street and Bridge Street (Route 38); thence easterly six hundred (600) feet to the aforesaid intersection; thence northerly by the east line of Old Bridge Street to the northern intersection of Old Bridge Street and Bridge Street; thence northeasterly across Bridge Street (Route 38) to the point of beginning, or take any other action relative thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section #3 of the Building Regulations of the Town of Pelham as amended by deleting the following sentence:

A fee of one dollar shall be paid for all applications and if a permit is issued a fee of five dollars shall be paid for all permits for the construction of new buildings and a fee of two dollars for all permits for the alteration of existing building when such alteration exceeds \$150,00 in value.



(1) A fee of one dollar shall be paid for all applications and if: a permit is issued for new construction the following fees shall be paid in addition thereto \$5.00 for the first \$5,000.00 costs of the proposed building.

The maximum fee shall not exceed \$100.00, or take any other action relative thereto.

Avenue, so called, southerly along the easterly side of Bridge Street, so called, five hundred (500) feet to land now



- 17. To see if the Town will vote to annul Article XVI of the Warrant of 1962, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition)
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to require that the building inspector be elected by the legal voters of the Town, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition)
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 for the completion of Gladys Street, so called, from Border Street, so called, to Robert Street, so called, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition)
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,410.00 for the purpose of tarring and applying other asphalt surface to Spring Street extension, so called, or also known as East Shore Road to Little Island Pond in Pelham, New Hampshire, from the Dracut line to the Honor Roll, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition)
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,925.00 for the purpose of tarring or applying other asphalt surface necessary to Cemetery Road, so called, from Bridge Street, so called, to and including the land of Edward Celino, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition)
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,535.00 for the purpose of gravelling and tarring Old County Road, so called, a distance of approximately 5/10 of a mile or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition)

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Pelham School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1962, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1961 and June 30, 1962, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$1,791.09 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1962.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1962, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net



Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1962, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1962, is indicated in Exhibit F.

Statement of Bonded Debt: (Exhibit J)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1962, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit J)

A statement of the School Tax account with the Town of Pelham is presented in Exhibit J. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1962, the School District had received from the Town the total amount of the 1961-62 School Tax plus \$7,429.60 of the 1962-63 School Tax. This represented a deficiency appropriation of like amount which was made at the school district meeting in March, 1962.

It is noted that the current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased from \$10,235.37 to \$2,026.46, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1962, as shown herewith:



Sherburne School had an actual enrollment of 445 pupils on December 1, 1962, and that our best estimate indicates an enrollment of 492 pupils in our next school year. Next vear there will be a need for two sections in each class making a total of 16 classrooms needed in 1963-64. It is difficult to place 16 rooms in a 15 classroom school which points up our problem as to where the extra classroom will be assigned. Your school board is already working on a solution to this problem and you may be sure the solution will be in terms of whatever arrangement is the best for the pupils involved. With this in mind one would have to say that the time has come when Pelham must take a careful look into the future and plan its school needs accordingly. The final decision will be yours to make, Will it be a new building housing grades six, seven, and eight? Will it be adding rooms to the present facilities. or will it be tuitioning out grades seven and eight? (This in my mind should be the last resort). No matter how we look at it the fact still remains that Pelham is growing rapidly and will continue to grow for some time to come.

As his report follows I will only say that the cooperation of Principal Oliver Chatfield and his teaching staff in promoting ever better instruction has been most gratifying. You can be proud of what your school is doing for your children.

SCHOOL LUNCH

Velma Houle and her aides are providing their usual fine hot lunches for the children of Pelham. The new dishwasher has increased the efficiency in that department but increased participation in the program has made more help necessary. The girls are doing a fine job and are to be complimented.

I herewith submit my report as Supervising Principal of the Ernest G. Sherburne School in the town of Pelham, New Hampshire.

Upon taking over the duties of principal of the Ernest G. Sherburne School late in January, 1962, I have witnessed an enthusiastic community that has shown strong interest and concern in a sound educational program for its children. I have seen a dedicated teaching staff that is cooperative, responsible and keenly ambitious in striving to bring out the highest potential ability of each individual student.

I have also witnessed the progress of a student body that is eager, responsive and responsible. In all of which, I am proud to have played a part.

Our enrichment program in Conversational French, instituted by Mr. Raymond Edwards, and under the capable instruction of Mr. Byron Carpenter, is running in high gear. The program this year includes grades 4 and 5 as well as 7 and 8. Next year the program will also include grade 6. Children in this program were selected on ability and interest. The enthusiasm and response of the children partaking in this program are most gratifying.

The modern mathematics program, though still relatively new in educational circles, was initiated this year in grades 1 and 2, as well as the junior high. At this early stage, I feel it quite safe to say that this program is rapidly proving to be the challenge our students have needed. Next year we plan to include modern mathematics in grades 3 and 4.

body". Certainly, everyone these days is aware that a sound physical education program is needed in our schools. Mr. Robert Jackson and Miss Patricia Leahy have helped to initiate such a program in the junior high. However, because of their teaching load we have been unable to provide more time for these children in this vital area. I feel with the additional teacher next year in the junior high we will be in a better position to provide an adequate program that will stress, coordination, rhythm mental as well as physical alertness, fair play, team work, poise and confidence. I am looking forward optimistically to next year when we can include intermural program for grades 5 and 6 that will stress the fundamentals of basketball, volleyball, and softball.



We certainly started this year with many different contagious diseases besides viruses and colds. In addition I experienced a new responsibility with the opening of our new Parochial School. Father Kilcoyne, Sister Mary Alice and Sister Mary Karen were very cooperative and helpful.

Mrs. Catherine Hammond, our speech teacher, comes to Pelham every Tuesday morning and is doing splendid work with our speech defective pupils.

In December, Miss Constance Martin, RN, our T.B. nurse from Concord, Patch tested 301 pupils in both schools, with four reactors that were X-rayed and found negative. In April we had a pre-school clinic for children entering school in September. 73 attended and were given physical examinations by Dr. Tuttle of Nashua and Dr. Burns of Milford. At this time 20 were vaccinated for small pox. They all had dental examinations by a dental hygienist and were weighed, measured and eye tested by the Supervisory Union #27 nurses. Some of the local mothers served as clerks.



The days at school just aren't long enough to get the work done, more children, more problems, but if we all work together, the home, the church and the school, our problems will get smaller and fewer. I want to thank all who helped during the year, the clergy, doctors, nurses, organizations, parents, clerks, Mr. Ramsay, Mr. Edwards, Mr. Chatfield and the teachers for their cooperation and contributions.

Dear Mr. Ramsay:

The following paragraphs constitute my first report to you as Teacher Consultant in the Town of Pelham, New Hampshire. As I stated last year in my report as Principal of the E. G. Sherburne School, maintaining high standards of instruction is a task continued successfully only by means of a high degree of cooperation by all members of the team associated with the school. During the past year I have found this team to be closely knit, cooperative, and working towards a common goal of providing better education for the youth of Pelham. It is indeed a privilege to be a member of this team.

Any educational team can best be evaluated by the degree of progress attained in intensifying and diversifying the instructional program. I believe the record speaks well for the Town of Pelham.

Modern Mathematics is now a reality in our school system. Last September the program was instituted in Grades 1 and 2 and will be followed by Grades 3 and 4 next September. I am indeed proud of the dedicated efforts of our teachers to make this program a success. The entire staff is making every effort to acquire additional training in this field at considerable cost.

Pelham has reason to be very proud of the calibre of textbooks available to the children. We have made a great deal of progress in modernizing all textbook series currently in use. To meet the modern textbook needs in a rapidly growing community is indeed a difficult challenge. The people of Pelham are very effectively musting that challenge.

Under the able leadership of Bryan Carpenter our conversational French program is growing into a healthy and permanent part of the instructional program. Currently the fourth, fifth, seventh and eighth grades are involved in the program with the sixth grade to be included next September. When our present fifth grade class completes the eighth grade they will be prepared to enroll in French II as freshmen in high school. This will be an accomplishment to which the people of Pelham can point with great pride. I hasten to point out, however, that Mr. Carpenter has been carrying on the French program in addition to his

the Pelham Townspeople will support our request for this additional teacher just as they have met our needs in the past.

Class size continues to be a problem at the E.G. Sherburne School. Our present third and fifth grades have reached a rather bulky stage. As our school system grows in size I hope that Pelham's Townspeople will keep a careful eye on class size lest we endanger our present high instructional standards.

Paul L. O'Neil closed his last report to the Town of Pelham with a quote from Benjamin Willis, one of our nation's top educators. I believe that quote to be worth repeating. "Generally, to speak of the school is to conjure up in the public mind an image of a building. It would be closer to the truth if the word School were to bring to mind a picture of the Teacher. The Teacher Makes The School."

The board would like to take this opportunity to commend the professional staff of the school on their efforts in setting up the effective, efficient system on which the school is operating. It is with pride that we read the local papers and note the large number of high school students from Pelham who are on school honor rolls. This surely is conclusive evidence of the conscientious work being done in educating our children.

The board commends Mrs. Anna Horskin, our school nurse, on her excellent supervision of the health of our children. We also feel that with the ever-increasing enrollment in both schools in Pelham, she should be given another day in which to complete her health program.

We wish to commend the cafeteria workers on operating a well-balanced, efficient School Lunch Program. With the ironing out of a couple of problems in the new dish washing setup, it is the board's hope that work will be easier for the help.

The board commends the custodian on maintaining a clean and efficient school in the face of ever increasing enrollment.

In looking over the budget you will note a substantial increase. This is partially because of an increase in teachers' salaries; to more closely meet the standards of this area; partially because of the necessity of securing an additional teacher to better our curriculum; and partially because of the increase in the enrollment which comes about every year. Our transportation, both to high and to elementary school, is overcrowded and part of the budget increase will go to relieve that situation. In considering this budget the board has asked for the smallest amount necessary to maintain a good school system. It is the board's wish to spend this money to the best possible advantage and to be able to enrich the general fund with a surplus.

The children of the town are utilizing the facilities of the cafetorium more and more. This is considered to be a good healthy condition and the board hopes it continues.

Our estimated enrollment for next year is 492 pupils. Every grade in our school, with the exception of the fourth has two sections. Next year, there is the possibility that the fourth will have two sections using the cafetorium as a classroom. There is also a possibility of the first three grades needing three sections within the next two years.

Our high school students will number over 180 next year. Our cost for tuition and transportation for High School students is \$101,450.00, better than 1/3 our total appropriation. Also, our students are attending two high schools on a year to year basis. This presents the possibility of a problem we have had in the past. Will we be cut off as we have been in other high schools? In 1965 we could have a six year high school of our own with an enrollment of 350 or more, leaving our present junior high rooms for elementary expansion. Is this the answer?

A School Planning Committee should be voted at this meeting. To put this off any longer might prove to be more expensive for the school district.

The board wishes to thank the individuals and organizations in town who have contributed time, effort and money in aiding the school.

are operating the program with three luli-time workers. Mrs. Ethel Duarte, Mrs. Hellen Orlando and myself and Mrs. Dorothy Hardy, who works from ten to one daily. In 1962 we served 45.264 student lunches, 2,630 adult lunches and 29.010 1/2 pints of milk to cold lunch children. These figures speak for themselves. Each of us connected with the lunch program is pleased to see so many parents taking advantage of a balanced meal for each participating pupil. I say balanced because needless to say we do not always please every child but we are sure that they receive their minimum requirements of two ounces of protein. three-quarters cup of fruit or vegetable, two tsp. butter, one or more slices of bread and eight ounces of whole milk daily. We have found that with proper encouragement the youngsters soon learn to eat different and perhaps strange to them foods.

Federal food subsidies have been increased this year. It is interesting to note that from the opening of school through Christmas vacation we have received \$1,428.26 in cash reimbursements and \$2,230.65 worth of surplus commodities. This is one of the important factors in financing a lunch program. No program could operate on a twenty-five cent charge per meal and \$1,600.00 district appropriation as in Pelham without this additional aid.

Last year we began to offer reduced rates to families with four or more participating in the program so that we now have twenty pupils on this schedule.

The shiny new look in the kitchen is a complete stainless steel dish washing and handling unit installed at the opening of school. This machine has the capacity to complete the dishes from the first group before we serve the second group. We still have a few "bugs" that the school board is attempting to "exterminate". We know that this investment will answer a big problem in our daily work routine.

Special thanks go to the women of the town who have given of their time and talent when needed, school picnic, Open House, Thanksgiving dinner, Education Week and Christmas, are a few of the days that they make it possible for us to take care of the entire school enrollment and give them the extras we could not provide alone. They are: Mrs. Barbara Hinds, Mrs. Eleanor Burton, Mrs. Carla Hobbs, Mrs. Laverne Steck, Mrs. Mabel Nolin, Mrs. Dorothy Meads, Mrs. Mable Burton, Mrs. Caroline Law, and



program; the Police Relief Association, Pelham Grange, the American Legion Auxiliary, the Salvation Army and the Parent Teacher's Association. From these donations we have been able to serve 674 lunches free to children during 1962.

In working toward a successful lunch program through cooperation and communication, remember the success of this program depends on parents and staff. It has been said that the word "together" is one of the most important words of the English language. Coming together indicates beginning, keeping together indicates progress, but working together assures success. This is your School Lunch Program.

INVENTORY AND EXEMPTION BLANKS

Inventory Blanks will be distributed to all property owners the latter part of March. Instructions for filling out these blanks and laws relating to inventories are found on the back of the form and should be read and carefully followed.

Exemptions for War Service Application will also be distributed the latter part of March. New residents and new property owners should apply to the Board of Selectmen for blanks as applications are only sent to Veterans who have formerly received Exemptions. The Selectmen have no way of knowing whether a new resident is a Veteran or not. Veterans should carefully read the laws and instructions relating to the Exemption on the back of the form.
