- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges and make appropriations of the same.
- 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, and set apart for town maintenance of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police Department for the ensuing year.
- 6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department for the ensuing year.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$240 for street lighting for the ensuing year.
- 8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the aid of the town poor for the ensuing year.
- 9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for old age assistance for the ensuing year.

and appropriate for the Public Library in addition to the amount required by law.

- 11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for cemeteries for the ensuing year.
- 12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 13. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay on the town debt.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum sufficient to defray interest charges on town notes for the ensuing year.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise \$100.00 for the repair of railings on the North Bridge on the Windham road.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise \$1,200.00 for W. P. A. projects for the ensuing year, or take any other action relative thereto.
- 17. To see if the town will accept state aid, and raise and appropriate sufficient money to carry the same into effect.

There have been no changes in the teaching staff in Pelham for the past two years, and the teachers are still con-
