To the inhabitants of the Town of Pelham in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Pilgrim Hall in said Pelham on Tuesday the twelfth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations of the same.
3. To choose a Delegate or Delegates to the Constitutional Convention.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart the amount of money necessary to secure

State Aid for permanent improvement of highways, under the law passed January Session, 1905.

5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the repairs of highways and bridges for the year ensuing and make appropriation for the same and to determine in what manner the same shall be expended.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the extermination of the Gypsy and Brown tail moths, and take any other action in relation thereto.

7. To choose two persons for three years for Trustees of Cemeteries.

8. To choose one person for Trustee of Public Library for three years.

9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the Public Library in addition to the amount required by law.

10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Cemeteries for the ensuing year.

11. To see if the Town will vote to choose one or more persons as Assessors, to act in conjunction with the Selectmen in the appraisal of property and assessment of taxes. If voted in the affirmative, to choose such person or persons by ballot.

12. To see if the Town will vote to erect where required, and repair any guideboards now in Town. If voted in the affirmative, to raise and appropriate money for the same and determine in what manner the same shall be carried into effect.

13. To see if the Town will vote to build a Town Hall

building and if voted in the affirmative to see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the same. Also, to choose agents or committees to carry the same into effect, or take any other action relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of two per cent. on tax list of 1912, paid on or before Sept. 1, 1912.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

in a little town like ours and a sure sign of progress and tends to a better people and a better town.
