THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pelham, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see what disposition the Town will make of the literary fund for the ensuing year.
- 4. To see what disposition the Town will make of the dog fund for the ensuing year.
- 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for school purposes for the ensuing year.

- 6. To choose one or more persons for Trustees of the Public Library for three years.
- 7. To choose two persons for Trustees of Cemeteries for three years, and to see if the Town will authorize any change in the Cemetery by-laws.
 - 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the Public Library for the year ensuing in addition to the amount required by law.
 - 9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for cemeteries for the year ensuing.
 - 10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise to pay on the town debt for the year ensuing.
 - 11. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges for the year ensuing, and determine in what manner the same shall be expended.
 - 12. To see how much money, if any, the Town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day.
 - 13. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of two per cent. on taxes of 1902 list that are paid on or before Sept. 1, 1902.
 - 14. To see how much money the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow, as a temporary loan, in anticipation of taxes.
 - 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise money to buy or have constructed, a small derrick suitable for the use of the town in the repair of bridges and culverts, and

if voted in the affirmative, to choose all necessary agents and committees therefor.

16. To transact any further business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Town of Pelham, N. H., for the Year

ENDING MARCH, 1902.

To write a report of the schools of our little community is but to write what is already known.

The children themselves in the home, in the public gathering, wherever met are an embodied report of the schools. A person understanding the schools could almost tell at sight to which of the five a child belonged, so powerful is the influence of surroundings and of teachers.

Yet whatever calls attention and fixes it even momentarily upon this, our greatest responsibility, is of value.

The two questions, what can be done for the children and what can be done for the schools, so interblend that they become one and the same.

Every citizen should stand shoulder to shoulder with every other in the work of caring for the coming generation in helping to give protection, guidance, equipment, and this organized help is best given through the schools. Therefore the schools are a great and sacred trust, they will be, in part, at least, our Book of Judgment.

All advance in means of travel, all advance in means of communication, all new inventions, indicate the stairway of progress up which the generations are climbing.

Every sentiment of justice and of kindness demands that we see to it that so far as possible the children be well equipped for the journey on which they are started. It is our blame largely if life be a defeat.

Conditions change, therefore needs and methods change but the great principles of education remain fixed.

To be able to do for ones self to use all ones faculties to the best advantage is education, is power.

This is something to be taught, not by withholding needed help, but by teaching persistence in effort, cheerful endurance under difficulties and unyielding courage under all conditions.

Ability to think is what the scholar needs, and the wider the range of this ability, the freer the individual will be in his choice of labor and consequently more the master of situations and circumstances.

It does not so much matter what the pupil has learned of geography or how many hard and perplexing problems he has solved in arithmetic and algebra, but it does matter beyond all power of words to express, whether or not he can read and write and speak his own language with ease and correctness, and whether or not he can add, subtract, multiply and divide with lightning quickness and absolute accuracy.

The time is at hand when the world will have small place for blunderers. The twentieth Century will have no time for mistakes.

TEACHERS.

We expect to be able to keep three of our five teachers with us. If they remain we are sure not only of thorough and faithful teaching in three of our schools,

but we are also sure of a kindly and uplifting influence that will count for much in the after lives of their pupils.

If the young teachers of the other two schools leave us in order to pursue their own studies in the higher institutions it is to be hoped that their places may be filled by those who are fully competent and as willing to do faithful work.

SUPPLIES.

We often long for larger resources that we might do more in the way of improved supplies and furnishings for our school rooms, but upon the whole your committee feel that compared with other rural towns, we have much for which to be thankful.

GENERAL READING OF SCHOOL CHILDREN.

The books that the children read are either a help or a hindrance to school work. By giving thought and attention to this matter, parents can be a great help to the teacher.

School No. 2. — First term, 35 scholars; second, 32; third, 27; for the year, 36 — 17 boys and 19 girls. Average attendance, 27.

TRUSTEES' REPORT.

The library enters upon its new year under conditions as favorable as existing circumstances warrant. The trustees very much regret the slowness of growth of the library in number of volumes, which is due to the limited amount of funds at their command for the purchase of new books. We need more money to buy books, and it has been suggested that some friend of the library should get up some sort of an entertainment, the proceeds of which to go to the library for the purpose of adding new books. We think this a good scheme. Now who will be the first one to act upon this suggestion? One hundred dollars is about all the town can afford to raise each year as an appropriation, but we certainly could use more to advantage. How we are to get it is a question which remains to be solved. However, considering that the library has only been in existence ten years, I suppose we have no reason to complain of it just as it is; but we, and we have no doubt, many others would like to see more books added every year. The library has proved itself so indispensable to the town that

we think it deserves the unanimous and hearty support of all the town's people and while it has this its prosperity is assured.

About seventy-five new books have been added this year by the trustees, which was as many as the funds at our disposal would warrant our purchasing.

Quite a number of volumes have been presented by individuals, and the trustees take this occasion to recognize the receipt of the same and thank the donors for their gifts. We also wish again to thank the librarian for her efficient services and the interest she has shown in the welfare of the library.

We again urge those interested to express a choice in regard to the books which they wish purchased by handing in lists to the trustees or librarian, by so doing they will greatly aid us in the selection of books. In spite of our continued appeals, there have been very few lists handed in in the past. Now let every one, who likes to read books, make out a list of what they want.

There will be a supplementary catalogue of books added the past year printed in the town report.

Hoping some way may be devised by which the library may obtain a larger addition of books the coming year, and with best wishes for its prosperity, this report is respectfully submitte \(\frac{1}{2}\).
