STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pelham on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at one of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers as provided by law.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart \$5,000, provided that the State Highway Department apportion an equal amount to constitute a joint fund for reconditioning and maintenance of State Aid highways designated by the State Highway Commissioner.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart the amount necessary for the construction of permanent highways under the law passed at the January session, 1905.
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town maintenance of highways and bridges, and determine in what manner the same shall be expended.
- \$200 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust to be used with the amount appropriated by the State.
 - 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500 to paint the Town Hall and install a new furnace therein,
 - 8. To see how much money the town will raise and appropriate for the Public Library in addition to the amount required by law.
 - 9. To see how much money the town will vote to appropriate for cemeteries for the ensuing year.

- 10. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 11. To choose two persons for three years for Trustees of Cemeteries.
- 12. To choose one person for three years for Trustee of Public Library.
- 13. To choose one person for three years as Trustee of Trust Funds of the town.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when they make their appraisal in April.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 2 per cent on all the 1928 taxes paid on or before Sept. 1, 1928.
- 16. To see what action the town will take relative to the removal of snow from the highways, and to make appropriation and raise sufficient money to carry the same into effect, or take any action relative thereto.
- , 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum not to exceed \$5,000 in anticipation of taxes.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to appropriate \$1,000 from the General Fund to build a garage for the fire truck and to take any other action relative to this subject.
- 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

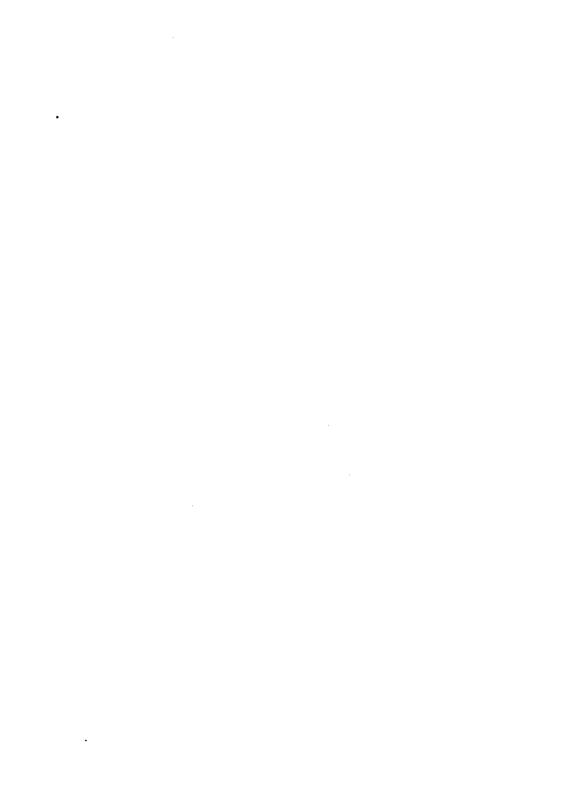

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Pelham, Greeting:

It gives me pleasure to submit herewith my ninth annual report as superintendent of your schools, and to it I have attached reports from the principal of the high school and from your school nurse.

MEMBERSHIP

The average membership of your schools for the past nine years is as follows, starting with the school year 1919-20, 168, 186, 203, 185, 163, 161, 154, 164, 158, the last figures being the present membership. For the past five years there seems to be but little change. In all probability, with the present public spirit favoring good schools and good roads, there will be at least no decrease in numbers in your schools in the immediate future.

TEACHERS

At the close of the last school year all your teachers signified their intentions of returning for another year, a practically unprecedented record for any municipality. This speaks well for your judgment, for the teachers' work, and for the disposition of the people.

Had not illness prevented, all seven teachers would have been at their desks when the schools opened in September. The invalidism of Mrs. Brown has been a decided loss to your school system. She and her family have the deepest sympathy of the entire community and the earnest wish for her speedy recovery. Miss Kondrat, who is filling Mrs. Brown's position, is meeting with excellent success and is well received by the town's people.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Ever since the Junior High School has been built the used approach to the building has been flooded at every wet period. A driveway and walk sufficiently raised to be above the water at all times would greatly improve the accessibility and appearance of the structure and would be a great convenience to all who have to enter the school during wet or slushy weather. I

presume a portion of the expense would be borne by the school from funds which have been accumulated, in case the school district would finance the project. It should be done whether or no the school contributed.

Your children now have the benefits of a neighboring school or are carried in speedy and convenient conveyance. The school buildings are heated by indirect radiation and in most instances the lighting is adequate and correct. They are taught by trained and experienced teachers. They are furnished with sufficient books, supplies, and equipment. It seems to me that the toilet facilities of the schools are in marked contrast to all this. I hope that the district may in the near future see fit to install chemical toilets connected with the main buildings.

I wish to call your attention to what is being done in two towns of this union in regard to noon lunches, and recommend for your careful consideration the adoption of similar measures in Pelham.

Those of you who have had the experience of eating cold lunches daily for a period of years appreciate the strain of so doing on the physical system. This practice is likely to be the more harmful to the growing child who hurriedly and improperly eats his cold lunch at the mid-session or noon recess, or at both.

A lunch counter is frequently found in our larger schools, but much of the food served often consists of cold sandwiches, ices, or candies. Such an arrangement serves only as a little convenience to the housekeeper who prepares the lunch and does not lessen the deleterious effects of the cold lunch. Plans have been worked out and put into execution in the Webster School in Hudson and in the Litchfield School by which the pupils of these schools are given a midday lunch which is warm, healthful, nutritious, and satisfying. The expense of these lunches to the parent is but 20 cents and three potatoes per week, much less than it would cost to feed them in their homes, even if it were possible to do so. The menus served in one of these schools for the five days of the week Dec. 23-27 inclusive, which is a fair sample of the various weeks of the year, is given below.

Monday—Creamed potatoes and carrots and mashed potatoes.

Tuesday-Italian macaroni and cocoa.

Wednesday-Braised beef and boiled potatoes.

Thursday—Tomato bisque and crackers.

Friday—Fish chowder and crackers.

These are served in generous portions to each child. In this

way about a hundred children are fed in these two schools. In Hudson the domestic arts teacher takes charge of the lunches and prepares them with the aid of a small number of children from one of her classes. In Litchfield, a lady of the town is hired for two hours daily to see to this matter.

I believe that some similar procedure would be very beneficial for our Junior High.

I believe it should be our policy in hiring teachers for our vacancies to secure the best trained teachers we can at a salary approximating the minimum and to raise the pay for a period of years for each year of service of the satisfactory teacher. This makes our schools more or less training schools, but we should keep the satisfactory teacher in training as long as possible. I hope sufficient inducements may be offered some of our present teachers to hold them for another year. It must also be remembered that the attitude of the public in making the teacher feel "at home" makes it much easier for the board to retain desirable teachers.

Thanking the teachers for their untiring efforts, the board for its ceaseless labors, and both for the many considerations shown to me, this report is

REPORT OF HEADMASTER

Pelham, N. H., February 3, 1928.

Mr. Louis D. Record, Supt. of Schools, Pelham School Committee,

Citizens of Pelham:

I have the privilege herewith to submit my second annual report of activities and work accomplished in Pelham High

School from September 12 to date.

On September 12, 1927, the Pelham High School opened with an enrollment of eleven members in the ninth grade (first year of high school) and six members in the tenth grade (second year of high). This was five more than the previous year, and which must show the growing confidence of the town's people in their two-year high school.

The high school curriculum is as follows:

YEAR I English
Hist. of Civilization
French II
Com. Arith. and Geog. 40 min. period—5 days per week
40 min. period—5 days per week
40 min. period—5 days per week
40 min. period—5 days per week

YEAR II English 40 min. period—5 days per week Mod. European Hist. 40 min. period—5 days per week French III 40 min. period—5 days per week Com. Arith. and Geog. 40 min. period—5 days per week

For a 20-minute period each day the two classes (combined) have Fundamentals. Fundamentals consists of a review of all subjects which form a basis of education, arithmetic, spelling, grammar and geography. We also spend a large per cent of these periods for current events and oral topics.

As has been the custom for several years the school (including Junior and Senior High School) held a bazaar. This not only gives the children an opportunity to earn money for their fund but it very successfully teaches them responsibility, for every pupil has some part to perform.

Last year's money was used (as the children suggested) to put the name "Pelham Junior High School" in front of the building. It is very evident that the children worked hard for this event and should be given opportunity to use the proceeds as they choose (providing of course it is for some benefit to

them—work or play).

One week in November was set aside to sell various magazines published by the Crowell Company. One-half the price of each subscription was received by the school. This money was used to buy a football for the boys and a soccer ball for the girls.

We have recently learned that posture plays the most important part concerning good health of a person. "Why not begin when a child?" we ask. So we of Pelham High School shall from now on practice always good posture in sitting, in standing, in work and in play, both at home and at school.

I wish to extend (no less heartily than last year) the thanks of the Pelham High School teachers to the Superintendent, to the School Board, to the parents and all the citizens of Pelham who have contributed so faithfully to the success of the present school year, now half over.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

To the School Board and Citizens of Pelham:

I tender my report as school nurse for the past year.

The number of children that are 7 per cent or more underweight has increased since last year, but we have less defective teeth and tonsils. A large number of the children that are underweight are the children with other defects, and I think when the parents realize this and have the defects corrected and also give their children something hot for lunch our number of underweight children will decrease.

I am greatly pleased in the improvement shown in teeth, tonsils and vision in all the schools, especially at the Gumpus School, where there have been a large number of corrections made and these corrections have been made at the expense of the parents rather than at a clinic, and it shows a splendid spirit by the parents.

Most of our defective vision is still from the Center School and Gage-Hill. I wish this could be investigated and see if something could be done about the lighting of the rooms, if this is what causes the defects. I think there are too many trees at the Gage-Hill School. This affects the light in the room very badly in the afternoon and also keeps out the sun, and we need all the sun we can get in our school-rooms.

We have had very little trouble with pediculosis this year, and very little sickness in our schools.
