#### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Pelham, on Tuesday, March 10 next at 10 of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects;

The Polls open at 10 A. M. and close not earlier than 8 P. M.

- 1. To chose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing and as provided by law.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges and make appropriation of the same. That is, if the Town will vote to accept the Town Budget as prepared by the Budget Committee and to take action thereon.
- 2. To bring in your ballot on the following question. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be declared no longer in effect in this Town?
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$542.69 as the Town's share of Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$3,617.92 as the State's share.
- 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to purchase and erect suitable road signs.
- 6. (By petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,500.00 for the improvement and surfacing with tar or asphaltium the Jeremy Hill Road.
- 7. (By petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,200.00 for improvement and tarring of the highway starting at Salem Line (Wormald's corner) to New Salem Road (Ferland's corner) in the year 1953.
- 8. (By petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for improvement and

tarring or asphalt mix, or other black top surface on the socalled D. Simpson Road, starting from Windham Road, westerly and northerly to the so-called Tallant Road, and to be done in the year 1953.

- 9. (By petition) We petition that the road known as Gumpas Hill Road or Seavey Road, so-called, a distance of 3/10th of one mile, be improved by a tarred or oil surface or by other means to give the road a hard permanent top. Estimated cost \$600.00.
- 10. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to deed to Anthony Bolduc for the sum of \$1.00 the five acres reserved out of the Frye Gage farm for a Town dump. The same was condemned by the State Health Department.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when they make their appraisal in April.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to invite the State Tax Commission to assist the Selectmen in making a re-appraisal of the Town and appropriate \$2,000.00 for the same.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and make appropriation of \$200.00 to cover the expense of such audit.
- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.
- 15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$2,067.02 to cover the deficit of the year ending December 31, 1952.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Collector of Taxes additional compensation for his services in collecting the State Head Tax and to fix the amount thereof (Selectmen recommend \$100.00).
- 17. (By petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 to have two blinker lights installed at two dangerous intersections. One to be installed at the northern end of the common known as Bridge Street and Gage Hill Road. The other at the south end of the common

known as Marsh Road and Route 38 and to instruct the Scleetmen to bargain for the same.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### **AUDITORS' REPORT**

We, the undersigned Auditors of the Town of Pelham, hereby certify that we have examined the books of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Treasurer of Trust Funds, Treasurer of Cemetery Trustees, and Treasurer of the Library Trustees.

We find that the Selectmen have issued orders on the Treasury in the amount of \$138,181.39. All were properly vouched.

We find that the Treasurer had on hand \$9,254.64 January 1, 1952. He has received from all sources \$144,104.84, and has paid orders totaling \$138,180.42, leaving a balance on hand of \$15,179.06.

The Tax Collector's accounts are as follows: She has collected \$67,096.87 on the 1952 levy, \$15,383.02 on the 1951 levy, and \$205.03 on the 1950 levy. Uncollected taxes amount to the following: 1952—\$18,598.32, 1951—\$30.30. Tax abatements amounted to \$486.68. The tax sale amounted to \$1,299.76.

The Town Clerk received \$60.98 in 1951 auto permits, \$4,427.70 in 1952 permits, and paid the Treasurer \$4,419.95. He received \$771.00 in Dog Licenses, retained \$81.59 in fees, and paid the Treasurer \$689.41.

The Trust Funds now amount to \$15,568.29. The Treasurer of these funds had a balance of \$525.34 on hand to start the year. Income amounted to \$656.07. \$484.02 was spent during the year, leaving a balance on hand at the end of the year of \$697.79.

The Cemetery Trustees had a balance of \$127.52 on January 1. Income was \$545.00. They spent \$645.61, leaving \$26.91 in the bank.

The Library Trustees had \$128.56 on hand—they received \$835.23—payments were \$701.44—leaving \$262.35.

The Gage Fund amounts to \$1.00.

#### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

To the Pelham School Board:

In submitting my fourth annual report on the condition of your school it is a real pleasure to be able to report that the past year has been marked by continued cooperation from local organizations, parents, and teachers. This should be the case, because without it a good educational climate cannot be provided. However, in too many districts, the schools have become the scapegoat for relieving the many tensions and anxieties that exist today.

You have been fortunate in being able to retain your complete staff of full time teachers again this year. A good educational program, which is consistent from grade one to eight is only possible when teachers have worked together for a few years. It is going to become increasingly difficult for the small and medium size towns to hold its teachers, as many of the neighboring cities are not only paying much higher salaries, but are now finding it necessary to hire married teachers and to lower their educational requirements to fill vacancies on their staffs.

Mrs. Sherburne is doing a fine job in giving the youngsters a foundation for future interest and ability in the field of art. It must be remembered that it takes several years of such instruction before the actual results become too apparent. I am sure that many parents have already begun to notice a new interest in this field.

The abnormally large enrollment in the first grade has presented a very serious problem. The appointment of Mrs. Mary Mooney has proved to be a very happy solution to this problem. By working with a small group of these youngsters in the morning she is able to give them the attention that is so badly needed by children of this age in reading and arithmetic. It has been necessary for her to hold this class in the cafeteria. This has been somewhat of a handicap to the two school lunch workers, but through mutual cooperation and understanding between the teacher and workers the necessary adjustments have been much smoother than I at first thought they would be.

The census report would indicate that another large first grade enrollment can be expected next year. To cope with this situation it would seem to call for another full time teacher to handle a combination first and second grade. This will mean an even greater problem for those who serve the noon meal, but I am confident that this can be solved.

Although it is difficult to predict the full effect of new families moving into town upon the school enrollment two years hence, it now looks as though there would be a normal first grade in September, 1954. If such is the case, it will give the school board time to analyze the school enrollment trends more accurately. The census report next fall should answer many questions as to the necessity of further expansion.

I would like to express my appreciation for the fine cooperation and support the school board has given me this past year. Being a comparatively new board, it has been necessary to devote more time in studying the many problems, but the decisions made have been sound educationally and financially.

### REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

Pelham, N. H. February 1, 1953

To the Superintendent of Schools, the School Board and the Citizens of the Town of Pelham:

I herewith submit my annual report as School Nurse, from September 1, 1951 to September 1, 1952:

During the month of February, two Dental Hygienists from the N. H. Dental Services, sponsored by the Pelham Grange, applied fluorine in three applications and cleaned the teeth of 193 children. They found 952 cavities in the permanent teeth and 549 cavities in the first teeth. Six of the children were found with perfect teeth.

In March, Mrs. Birchall and I applied the T. B. Patch Test to 63 children from the first, fifth, and eighth grades and found no reactors.

In March we had an epidemic of influenza which affected the lower grades and our school telephone was a tremendous help to me in contacting the parents for information concerning the children.

During March, April, and May, Mrs. Fahey, the state nurse, held her pre-school clinic where 40 children were were vaccinated for small pox and 16 were given diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetanus shots in three doses and 5 were given the booster shots. In June we held our "Get Acquainted Day" for the incoming first grade and 30 children attended and enjoyed meeting future classmates and their teacher.

Our lunch program is running smoothly and is very well patronized.

The past year has been a very busy one and I would like to thank Mr. Hastings, the School Board, the teachers, and all the parents for their cooperation and hope they will continue this in the future.
