TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: Polls open 10 A. M., close 7 P. M.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pelham, on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, and as provided by law. Also to bring in your ballot on the following question:

(a) Shall the provisions of Chapter 171A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this town?

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges and make appropriations of the same. That is to see if the Town will vote to accept the Town Budget as prepared by the budget committee, and to take action thereon.

3. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$548.45 as the town's share of Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$2,193.81 as the State's share.

3a. To see if the Town will vote to recondition the "Burns Road," from the Mammoth Road to the Marsh Road and to black top or tar the same during the year 1950. The same to be done out of the Highway maintenance money.

4. To see if the town will vote to discontinue and repeal all Zoning and Building by-laws.

5. To see if the town will vote to add three street lights, as approved by the budget committee.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 for a heating and plumbing system for the fire house building.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$117.00 or some part thereof, a sum not exceeding 1/100 of one per cent of the town's valuation based on the 1949 valuation to the Merrimack Valley Regional Assn.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when they make their appraisal in April.

9. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.

10. To see if the town will vote to grant a discount on all property taxes of the 1950 list, paid in full on or before August 1, 1950—2 per cent, on or before Oct. 1, 1950—1 per cent or take any other action thereon.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Forest Fires — Our Most Shameful Waste

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 per cent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditures of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public — YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PREVENTION — fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

1. Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.

2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.

AUDITORS' REPORT

We, the undersigned Auditors of the Town of Pelham, hereby certify that we have examined the books and accounts of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Treasurer of Trust Funds, Treasurer of Cemetery Trustees, and Treasurer of Library Trustees.

We find that the Selectmen have issued orders on the Treasury to the amount of \$87,758.19. All orders were correctly cast and properly vouched.

We find that the Treasurer had on hand, January 1, 1949, \$1,953.31. He has received from all sources \$88,406.59 and has paid the above mentioned orders, leaving a balance on hand, December 31, 1949, of \$2,601.71.

The Tax Collector's accounts are as follows: She has collected in taxes and interest \$45,810.72 of the 1949 levy, \$10,700.78 of the uncollected 1948 levy, and \$20.02 of the uncollected 1947 levy. All sums collected have been paid over to the Treasurer. There remains \$10.00 uncollected on the 1948 levy. There are no uncollected taxes for the year 1947 or any previous year. The Selectmen have issued tax abatements to the amount of \$512.43. The amount of the Tax Sale was \$603.28, including taxes, costs and interest.

We find that the Town Clerk has received \$38.16 in auto permits for 1948-49, \$2,965.27 in permits for 1949-50. These sums have been paid over to the Treasurer. He received \$568.00 in dog licenses, retained \$68.00 in fees and paid to the Treasurer \$500.00

The Trust Funds now amount to \$14,911.77. The Treasurer of Trust Funds has an unexpended balance of \$498.47. The Capital Reserve Fund amounting to \$1,502.50 plus \$14.19 interest, a total of \$1,516.19, was turned over to the Treasurer of the School District.

The Cemetery Trustees had on hand January 1, 1949 the sum of \$16.99. They have received from all sources \$404.00. They have expended \$298.43 and have on hand, December 31, 1949 the sum of \$122.56.

The Library Trustees had on hand January 1, 1949, \$94.57, received from all sources \$708.95, expended \$642.54, and have on hand December 31, 1949 the sum of \$160.98.

The Gage Fund amounts to \$175.70.

STATE CHILD HEALTH AND IMMUNIZATION CLINIC

The annual child health examination and immunization clinic was held in Pelham Town Hall on the afternoon of June 9, 1949.

Of the fifty-eight children attending, there were seventeen infants and forty-one of preschool age, of these, thirty-five were without defects.

Eight children were vaccinated against small pox, thirty-five were given a booster dose of serum to help prevent diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus.

Dr. John Quigley and Dr. Otto Goldcamp were in the examination rooms assisted by Betsy Muzzey, R.N., and M. Currier, R.N.

Elinor Burton, R.N., and Anna Horskins, R.N., the local school nurse, weighed and measured each child before he was examined.

Mrs. Mable Burton was chairman of the committee in charge. She got the mothers and children in to the examination rooms in numerical order. Mr. Cookson of Nashua Red Cross chapter furnished transportation, assisted by Mrs. Clara Jack, R.N., who directed her to the various homes.

Mrs. Carla Hobbs, Mrs. Theresa Muldoon, Mrs. Elinor Burton, R.N., Mrs. Morrisette and other members of the Legion auxiliary served on the committee, and added considerably to the success of the clinic.

This was the first state clinic since their inception on July 21, 1926, at which Mrs. Alice Overlock was unable to take an active part. She was at Lowell General Hospital recuperating from the effects of a fractured hip. However, the local mothers and committee workers honored her years of interest and whole-hearted service by having a beautiful bouquet of red roses brought to her room at two o'clock, the hour the clinic started.

After the clinic a call was made on each child with any physical defect to discuss means of correction. Thus we aim to have each child a well child on entering school.

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Pelham, N. H., qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 25th day of March, 1950, at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, to fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
9. To see if the school district will authorize the school board to sign a tuition contract with one of the neighboring towns or cities; to apply any saving thus made toward transportation of high school pupils; and to designate one high school as the high school maintained by the Pelham School District for tuition purposes. Upon petition.
10. To see if the district will vote to use the non-partisan ballot for the election of district officers in accordance with the New Hampshire Election Laws.

11. To see if the district will appropriate the moneys received from the sale of buildings and equipment for the purpose of completing the new school project.

12. To see if the district will authorize the school board to transfer ownership of the No. 1 school house to the veterans of Pelham, under the trusteeship of the Post No. 100, American Legion, and to take any action necessary to affect this transfer.

13. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Pelham School Board:

It is with pleasure I herewith submit my first brief report on your school system.

The crisis in public education has been receiving nation-wide publicity. This crisis is upon us because of a rapidly increasing birth rate, a reluctance to raise teachers' salaries in line with wages in industry and the inability to construct needed new buildings during and immediately following the war. The most optimistic say it will face us for at least ten years and the Federal Census Bureau sees no real relief from the increased school population.

In surveying your own system to see how well it is equipped to meet this crisis you can justifiably feel a certain sense of pride. It is equipped to meet the crisis better than the majority of districts in the State.

The Ernest G. Sherburne School will provide the needed space to absorb the increased school population for several years to come. It is a building that both pupils and teachers should enjoy and it should develop a sense of pride that will in turn make better citizens of our young people. Pupil morale can make a great difference in the amount of school work a group will do.

As soon as the undeveloped areas, such as the lunch room and playground area, are completed there will be little to be desired as far as an adequate up-to-date school plant is concerned.

You are fortunate in having a staff of teachers who are conscientious and hard working. Every effort should be made to keep these teachers. Although there is now an over supply of secondary teachers, our colleges are graduating only about one-eighth the number of elementary teachers needed to take care of the normal turnover plus the additional ones needed due to the addition of new classes.

The first part of the year was difficult for both pupils and teachers but I feel confident that the children are now catching up on any school work they may have lost due to the construction of the new building.

It is my hope that the school will be used to the fullest extent possible. As time progresses I am sure the teachers will find many opportunities to expand their programs over and beyond anything possible under the limited facilities previously in existence. More and more the public should begin to make use of the building for public gatherings. A plant such as yours is too expensive an undertaking to be used only during school hours.

In conclusion I should like to thank the School Board for the fine cooperation shown me thus far. It is a real inspiration to work with a School Board, parents and teachers who seem to have the best interests of the children at heart and are willing to give these interests a first place in their thinking.
