THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham in the County of Hills-borough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pelham on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Polls to open at ten in the forencon and not to close earlier than seven in the afternoon.

- 1. A.—To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
 - B.—To bring in your ballot on the following question: "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be declared no longer in effect in this Town."
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges and make appropriations for the same, that is, if the Town will vote to accept the Town Budget as prepared by the Budget Committee and to take action thereon.
- 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the Inventory Blanks when they make their appraisal in April.
- 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$573.66 as the Town's share of Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$3,824.42 as the State's share, as provided by law.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purpose of tarring or asphalt mix or other black top surface on McGrath Road for a distance of approximately one-half (½) mile and to be done in the year 1956.

NOTE—Article 7 is by petition.

8. To see if the Town will authorize the Cemetery Trustees to sell the standing lumber in the rear of the Gibson Cemetery.

To see if the Town will authorize the Cemetery Trustees to affix

an annual assessment to non-resident cemetery lot owners of \$3.00 and \$6.00 for six bed and twelve bed lots respectively, for the maintenance of such lots.

10. A.—If Article Nine passes in the affirmative—

B.—To see if the Town will vote to have money received from same, deposited in a separate fund and used under the jurisdiction of the Cemetery Trustees for cemetery improvements.

NOTE—Articles 8, 9 and 10 are by petition.

11. To see if the Town will vote to make the Town Hall available without charge each and every Saturday evening from the first Saturday of October through the last Saturday in June for the recreational purposes of the Pelham Teen Canteen, a young people's group dedicated to creating wholesome recreational opportunities for teenagers.

NOTE—Article 11 is by petition.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.





Board of Selectmen Pelham, New Hampshire Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Pelham for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1955, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets:

December 31, 1954 — December 31, 1955: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1954 and December 31, 1955 are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein the financial condition of the Town changed from a Net Debt of \$4,981.00 to a Surplus of \$2,602.72, during 1955, indicating a gain of \$7,583.72.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1955, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$664.03, plus a revenue surplus of \$3,295.68, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$3,959.71.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1955, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1955, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks.

Conclusion:

The accounts and records of all town officials were found in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to prescribed methods.

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Pelham for their assistance during the course of the audit.





Be A Good Citizen — Cooperate

Smoking and debris burning caused more than 50 percent of the forest fires occurring in the state of New Hampshire in 1955—235 fires out of a total of 463 originated from these two sources. Lighted smoking material and matches thrown from moving vehicles along the highway or dropped by fishermen, hunters, hikers, berry and flower pickers accounted for 26 percent; debris burning in the wrong place or at the wrong time by those who failed to heed all pleas for safety or refused to recognize the logical, sensible rules and regulations set up under legislative authority governing the use of fire in or near woodlands accounted for more than 24 percent. This is inexcusable.


Everything possible is being done officially to remedy the situation. Since 1909 there has been a statute on our law books which requires everyone to secure written permission from the local forest fire warden before starting a fire in or near woodlands or where fire can be communicated to woodlands, unless the ground is covered with snow. A never ending program of educational work is being carried on by your local warden and state officials to inform the general public both of the value and necessity of securing the required permit for such burning. Much progress has been made, but there are still many who fail or refuse to cooperate. The value of our permit system was definitely proven in this district during the 1955 calendar year. Local wardens issued 1,861 permits for debris burning fires. That's a lot of permits. The records show only 8 permit fires got out of control. This proves several things while wardens were liberal in the issuance of fire permits, accommodating every applicant so far as possible, they were cautious, following directives outlining overall policy governing the issuance of burning permits and thoroughly instructing permit users. The latter, too, fully appreciating their responsibilities in using their permits, governed themselves accordingly. Result? Much burning done legally and safe.

But what of the smokers? Despite all the efforts of those officially charged with the responsibility of preventing fires, too many were cereless or thoughtless in disposing of smoking material and matches. Why? It is difficult to say. Autos are now equipped with ash trays. Why not use them. The crushing out of a cigar, cigarette and the complete extinguishment of matches before being discarded is an easy chore.

If the costly habits of the careless and indifferent smoker and debris burner could be overcome, more than half of our annual forest fires would be eliminated. WILL YOU do YOUR share to bring this about?

Remember

- 1. Get a written permit from your local warden before starting your debris burning or camp fire. The law requires it.
 - 2. Make certain they are dead out before leaving them.

REPORT OF PELHAM PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board held its first meeting on March 28, 1955 and at that meeting rules and procedures were adopted for the future conduct of the Board. Since that time there have been fourteen meetings of the planning board. Of these fourteen meetings five were special meetings having to do mostly with the drafting and planning of the building codes and zoning ordinance. The attendance at the fifteen meetings has been extremely well, averaging 88%. Several meetings were attended by the officials of the New Hampshire State Planning and Development Committee who advised and guided the board.

The Board devoted quite a few meetings to the discussion and adoption of Land Subdivision Controls, such authority to do so having been granted to the Board by the voters at the special town meeting. The regulations presently in force were adopted at the January 1956 meeting and were then recorded. Copies of these

regulations can be obtained by interested parties.


Various topics were discussed at the meetings but the major efforts of the Board in its first year were expended in the drafting of the Building Code, Zoning Ordinance, and Land Subdivision control Regulations, it being the consensus of the majority that once these regulations were established, the Board could then proceed to subjects not so pressing. Meetings of the Board are held at 7:30 P.M. on the first Monday of each month and the public is urged to attend and express their opinions and suggestions.

Polls will be open from 12:00 to 8:00 o'clock. Action upon remaining articles will begin at 2:00 P.M.

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing two years.
- 10. To see if the District will authorize the School Board acting upon the advice of a School Planning Committee, consisting of five persons elected by the School District, to study the school building problem in Pelham and to have preliminary plans and

We have been very fortunate this year and only had our usual run of colds during the winter months and in March we had a few cases of measles.

Our defective speech children were transported to speech class every Tuesday in Hudson. Several P.-T.A. members helped me with transportation during the year.

In April, Mrs. Birchall and I applied the T B Patch test to 73 children from the first, fifth and eighth grades and 4 adults. We had 2 children and 2 adults react and they were Xrayed and found free from T B.

In May, our first and second graders whose parents permitted them to have the Salk polio inoculations were inoculated. Fortyeight children were taken to the clinic in Salem, New Hampshire, for these inoculations.

In June we had our "Get Acquainted Day" for the incoming first grade and twenty-five children attended.

The P.-T.A., the Legion Auxiliary and the Police Department were very generous with donations so that free lunches and free milk could be given some of our children.

I want to thank Mr. Ramsay, Mr. McGrath, the teachers, the School Board, the Town organizations that contributed to the welfare of our children, the parents and all the pupils for their cooperation.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 3, 1956

To the School Board and citizens of Pelham, New Hampshire:

It gives me pleasure to submit my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Pelham is experiencing the same ailment that practically every town in this area of the state is experiencing, that is "Growing Pains". This year the additional teacher who has absorbed the overload in Grades 1 and 2 has been a definite advantage to the instructional aspect of the school. It has been to the credit of the voters of Pelham that they are ready to provide their children with the type of educational program and physical facilities that will encourage the development of healthy, well educated young people. That you have been able to provide your school with teachers who are interested in doing a good job has been all to your advantage. The ever increasing enrollment has now reached a point where certain decisive action should be taken and I note those areas in this report for your consideration.

1. I would recommend that immediate action he taken in se-

curing an additional teacher to relieve the large classes moving into grades 5 and 6. It goes without saying that it is difficult to carry on an entirely adequate instructional program in a crowded classroom. By instituting straight fifth and sixth grades and a combined fifth and sixth with the additional teacher two things would be accomplished. (a) Better instructional facilities, fewer health hazards by way of colds and other communicable diseases.

2. Pelham is once again in a position where an addition to the E. G. Sherburne School appears to be a must. A special article in the School Warrant indicates your School Boards decision to ask for a building committee to aid in the final decision as to actual needs, estimated costs, et cetera. It is your Superintendent's feeling that anything within reason that can be done for the educational advantages of Pelham children should have primary consideration.

Helping Teacher:

The election of Mr. John W. McGrath as Helping Teacher in Supervisory Union No. 27 has been a definite step in the right direction. In order to make Mr. McGrath's work definite, he has been put in charge of instruction in the various school districts. It is his job to work with and help the individual teachers, to survey instructional facilities and work with your Superintendent in building a better overall educational program. As his report follows, I shall only say that he has done his work exceedingly well and that the instructional level of our schools has improved through his conscientious efforts.

In closing I wish to thank the School Board, Citizens, Teachers and pupils for their friendly spirit of cooperation throughout the past year. It is only through cooperative effort on the part of all concerned that we can maintain the high level of education that Pelham has experienced in the past and is entitled to expect in the future. My first year has been an enjoyable one.

REPORT OF HELPING TEACHER

February 1, 1956 Hudson, N. H.

Mr. Louis L. Ramsay Superintendent of Schools Pelham School District Pelham, New Hampshire

Dear Sir:

I herewith submit my annual report as Helping Teacher for the Pelham School District. I have divided my report into two major categories:

(1) Present Status of the Curriculum, and (2) Future Planning for the curriculum. Further subdivisions have been incorporated for clarity.

Many people have not been able, as yet to clarify the positions of Helping Teacher. Shall it suffice to say that the Helping Teacher's role of counselor specialist and consultant to the professional staff, school board, parents, and to the community at large has one major objective, and that is the *improvement* of the educational growth and development of the children in our schools.

Much credit for hard and diligent work must be awarded to the teachers who formulate and carry out the curriculum that at present is instituted in our schools. They are always aware that in working with pupils — humans — they must be ever diligent about improvement in all the aspects of the curriculum.

I shall analyze our present situation in the schools of the District. An attempt will also be made to direct your attention to the future plans that are now, in many instances, in the embryonic or "thinking" stages. We hope all our plans will crystallize and, thus, perhaps, improve the total program.

(1) Present Status of the Curriculum:

(a) READING:

The Scott-Foresman system of basal readers is proving its worth. This is an extensive and expensive cumulative reading program which seems to produce readers who can, in most cases, read to capacity. Those children who can't read to capacity after being skillfully guided through this program are really out of the realm of solution of the ordinary classroom teachers. They are our unfortunate remedial cases. There is much strength in our reading program in Pelham, thanks to the publishers of our program and the conscientious work of the teachers. Pelham parents should be satisfied, in general, with the results of reading instruction in their schools.

(b) LANGUAGE:

Progress in this area has been generally satisfactory. More vital "life" needs to be injected into the McKee Language Program.

(c) SPELLING:

This is rapidly becoming as controversial an area as reading. We are fortunate! The teachers have done a more than acceptable work with our spelling program. The Pupils Own Vocabulary Spellers, which we use in grades two through eight, have proved to be a wise ascession. We have little about which to worry in this area! We are teaching spelling effectively!



A testing program has been instituted. In grades 1, 4, 8, and 10 intelligence tests will be administered each year during the month of September. In grade 1 the California Mental Maturity, Primary Test Form; test is used; in grades 4, 8, and 10 the California Short Form Tests of Mental Maturity are used — elementary advanced, and adult forms respectively. This is to become an annual affair.

Achievement testing in the Spring has been instituted and if this year's success is a measure of the usefulness of the program, I am positive that no one will be able to refute its necessity. In grades 1 and 2 the California Reading Test is administered; in grade 3 the California Achievement Battery, Primary Form (reading, arithmetic, and language) is administered. In grades 4, 5, and 6 the California Achievement Battery, Intermediate Form (reading, arithmetic, and language) is administered.

Cumulative records and the wealth of information that goes with each one have been instituted for all children. I am sure their usefulness will be felt in the future by our own schools and faculties and assuredly by the high schools to which our students are eventually graduated.

(f) ARITHMETIC:

We are ahead at many grade levels in this area. Sound concepts and understanding are being made to provide a solid arithmetical base for future life and future mathematical endeavors. Either teachers extremely like or dislike this area. We, on the whole, are fortunate that *most* of the Pelham teachers seem to give this area its just accent in the total program.

(g) SCIENCE:

We are in poor condition!

(h) SOCIAL STUDIES:

The curriculum follows the Follet social studies series in grades four through seven. The general State program is followed in grades one through three. In grade eight we have an excellent program covering elementary American History.

(i) MUSIC AND ART:

The teachers and respective supervisors have in operation a more than satisfactory program in each area. Mrs. Mary Sherburne, Art Supervisor, has done a commendable "job"; Miss Teresa Grace has done an excellent "job" — all with the aid and cooperation of the teachers.

(j) HANDWRITING:

This is a sadly neglected area, in general, of the Language Arts Program. The Kettle System is employed and needs to receive more emphasis than at present.

(2) Future Planning for the Curriculum:

(a) SCIENCE:

Naturally, this is a deplorably ignored area. We are normal and following a national trend. However, next year we hope to adopt a strong cumulative program. The teachers are now examining science programs for grades one through six; a strengthening for this area is necessary for next year!

(b) LANGUAGE:

Much discussion and revision is needed to produce a program in the Language area which stresses the skills on an equal basis with the social competencies to be gained. This is a major fault of the present program. This area deserves more attention!

(c) HANDWRITING:

Just consideration should be attributed to this area! Next year it is hoped that improvements will be made over the present status of the program!

(d) OVERALL:

Much planning and thinking about the curriculum is evidenced by what our teachers are producing. I am sure this constant and productive curriculum will continue as in the past.

This has been a rewarding year for the Helping Teacher. The wonderful cooperation of the Superintendent, Principal, Teachers, School Board Members, parents, and citizens of Pelham made it possible to do the job of "helping" with dispatch and meaning.


REPORT OF PELHAM SCHOOL BOARD

Notice to Owners of Dogs 111

The revised laws of the State of New Hampshire require the following:

- 1. That any owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over must register same.
- 2. That such dogs are to be registered at the Town Clerk's office.
- 3. That these registrations are to be obtained on or before April 30th each year.
- 4. That if same are not paid according to the above, a penalty of \$.50 becomes mandatory after June 30th.
- 5. That fees are as follows: Males \$2.00; females \$5.00; spayed females \$2.00; kennels of less than 6 dogs \$12.00; kennels of more than 5 but less than 11 dogs \$20.00.
