Town Warrant

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pelham on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To bring in your ballots upon each of the questions submitted by the Convention to Revise the Constitution relative to the amendments proposed by said Convention at a session held on January 28, 1921.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart the amount of money necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways under the law passed January session 1905.

5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year and determine in what manner the same shall be expended.

6. To see if the Town will vote to purchase an equipment of small tools and box for them, for each of the road commissioners, and appropriate money therefor; also to adopt a system for the care of same.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a portable stone crusher, and engine to operate the same, and raise and appropriate money to carry the same into effect.

8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the extermination of moths and beetles.

9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the Pine Blister Rust Control for the purpose of cooperating with the State and Federal Governments.

10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise in addition to the amount required by law, for the Public Library.

11. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for cemeteries for the ensuing year.

12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

13. To choose two persons for three years and one person for two years for Trustees of Cemeteries.

14. To choose one person for three years for Trustee of the Public Library.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$840. to pay the mortgage and interest on the

Town Hall, or some part thereof as the Town may determine.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when they make their annual appraisal in April.

17. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of two per cent on 1921 taxes paid before Sept. 1, 1921.

18. To elect three Selectmen, one for three years, one for two years, and one for one year.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

roundings, and this pride should be a sufficient guarantee of the discontinuance of this practice.

We desire to thank those who, by gifts or otherwise, have aided the Library.

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
6. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
7. To see how much money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools.
8. To see how much money the District will raise and appropriate for the tuition of pupils attending High schools or Academies.
9. To see how much money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of schoolhouses.
10. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum asked for to pay their proportion of the excess salary of the Supervisor.

11. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board, Truant Officer, District Clerk and all other District Officers.

12. To see if the District will vote to pay the tuition of pupils attending High Schools or Academies in excess of the amount required by law and if voted in the affirmative to raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary to carry this article into effect.

13. To see if the District will vote to carry forward work of the Junior High so it will conform to the first years work of High School and if voted in the affirmative to see how much money the District will raise and appropriate to carry this article into effect.

14. To see what action the District will take relative to further equipping and insuring the new school building and if voted in the affirmative to appoint committees and raise and appropriate money for the same.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD OF PELHAM:

Gentlemen—Herewith I submit my second annual report as superintendent of your schools.

A whole school year has now elapsed and we are well advanced on the second year of administration of the schools under the supervision of the State Board of Education. Permit me to call your attention to a few points in the working of the new plan, relative to the financing of our public schools in this union.

Fortunately for many towns in the State, the statute under which we are working went into effect at just the time when the cost of maintaining schools advanced in a measure commensurate with the rise in the maintenance of all other activities whether public or private. Teachers' contracts for service being of long duration had naturally not been effected by the general rise in wages to the same degree as had the remuneration for many other kinds of service. As books are made in large quantities for future sales the price of this school necessity did not advance until long after the rise in general commodities. Fuel has been steadily advancing during the last eighteen months. The cost of all general supplies and ordinary repairs have been on a level with war prices. Upon districts paying tuition to other districts there has been an additional charge of from 33 % up. It naturally follows that the cost of schools at the present time is higher than it has ever been before. Though there does not seem to be any

immediate prospect of any chance of cutting to any great extent the cost of maintaining schools of equal efficiency, there is also the probability that the per capita cost of maintenance need not be increased in the near future.

Under the provisions of both the old and the new law the State Board distributed funds to the towns of this union to equalize the burden of public schools for the school year 1919-20 as follows: Hudson, \$3,188.79; Pelham, \$897.78; Hollis, \$566.47; Merrimack and Litchfield, nothing. For the same purpose, the State Board proposes to distribute funds to meet the increased costs for the present school year as follows: Hudson, \$7,516.45; Pelham, \$4,364.01; Hollis, \$2,036.82; Merrimack, \$2,143.23; Litchfield, nothing. These towns paid this last year in state taxes for school purposes, including the funds from which the Superintendent's salary is paid, as follows: Hudson, \$1,960.36; Pelham, \$1,112.48; Hollis, \$1,220.03; Merrimack, \$1,971.54; Litchfield, \$501.37.

Without discussing the merits of the law, such has been the effect of the operation of the statute in this union. It is not necessary for me to point out what the effect would be on the tax rate in these towns of a reversion to the provisions of the old law.

The school district is to be congratulated on the erection of its new building. Much credit is due your building committee for its choice of plan, speed in erection, and excellence in workmanship of this new building. Your committee has surely served you well. It is to be regretted only that the appropriation was not sufficient for installing an appropriate heating plant, toilet facilities, and for fitting up in the basement rooms for manual training and

domestic arts. These matters will doubtless be provided for at your school meeting this year.

The more liberal policy adopted by the board this year in the matter of salaries, books and supplies, has enabled us to retain the services of our successful teachers and to engage new teachers more universally satisfactory than in the past, and to supply the schools with much needed equipment.

I have caused to be given in the schools in all grades above the second, in the months of October and February, standardized tests as follows: the Adams Test in reading, scoring for both speed and comprehension; the Ayers test in handwriting, marking both speed and legibility; the Starch Test in arithmetic, for accuracy in processes and reasoning; the Ayers Test in spelling, and the Harvard-Newton Test in composition. The markings are carefully recorded and will be carefully preserved for comparison with the same or similar tests given in May of this year. These tests have been carefully prepared by educators of known ability. The explicit directions for giving and scoring have largely eliminated the personal equation in the marks. The standardizing of these tests make them a basis for comparison with other school systems. They will reveal the standing of the various classes of our schools as compared with similar classes throughout the country and will form a basis for individual promotion. These tests have also proved of great value in revealing weak points where emphasis in drill or greater care in presentation is needed. An exhaustive study of the results of these tests at the end of the year will prove both interesting and of great help in planning the work of the next year.

There is no phase of our school work which has been advanced by the operation of the present law to the extent as has our labors for the health and physical development of the school children. Personally, I feel that there is no work in our school today that is equal in importance to this. I am sure you will agree with me that a sound and properly developed body, so cared for as to insure the possessor the enjoyment of good health, is a prime desideratum. If you differ with me at all in this matter, it will be with reference to where the obligation should lie for the care of the health and physical development of the child. However, you will agree with me that incident to the mobilization of our army for the World War, statistics revealed an alarming condition in the physical development of the American youth. The large percentage of our young men who were unfit to "go over the top" was a severe arraignment of American indifference or carelessness in the physical care of its youth. To be sure, it might be said, it should be obligatory on the parent to care for the offspring in these matters, but as long as there are careless, indifferent, or poverty stricken parents, and as long as nature blinds the eyes of the parent to the physical as well as the mental defects of the child, just so long will it be unsafe to leave this important matter to that source, unaided. Gradually the State has by statute delegated to the public schools responsibilities in this matter. Starting with a requirement for the teaching in the schools the evil effects of narcotics and alcoholic stimulants, the statute has passed through various requirements and enabling acts, until now it provides that standard schools must make "suitable provision for the care of the health

and physical welfare of all the pupils." I feel that your allotment of funds for this purpose for the past two years has been entirely inadequate for carrying out the intent of the law.

The report of your school nurse shows from the examination of 164 children there were found suffering from defective vision, 11, from perdiculosis, 29, from defective teeth, 91, from hypertrophied tonsils, 41, from adenoids, 3, from defective hearing, 1, and there were unvaccinated without a good reason for the neglect, 75. Since the last examination, I had been treated for hypertrophied tonsils, 3 had had teeth filled, and 11 had had their vision corrected by lenses.

Disregarding vaccination, these 164 children are suffering from 176 defects, the most of which can be remedied. Besides this there are a large percent of the children suffering from malnutrition.

Thanking the board for their cooperation this year and the teachers for their loyalty, this report is respectfully submitted.
