#### GRAVE FOREST SITUATION FOLLOWS SEP-TEMBER HURRICANE

Woodland problems of timber salvage and fire control created in many towns by the September hurricane are of the greatest importance. Good citizenship calls for per-

sonal and widespread action!

The salvage of every thousand feet of logs which can be sold means money for landowners, wages for workers, employment for trucks, teams and machinery, as well as reduced forest fire hazard for all. If owners of windthrown timber have not yet acted, they should communicate with those who can help. TOWN CHAIRMEN are fully informed; STATE ADVISORY AGENTS can help to start logging by suggesting names of operators and giving other useful advice; FEDERAL AGENCIES are increasing the number of log storage places as rapidly as possible. INDIVIDUALS MUST NOW CO-OPERATE.

Forest fire danger for several years will be greater than usual. So much work must be done by public agencies to reduce hazard along roadsides, near improved and other exposed areas that many places will remain hazardous for some time to come. INDIVIDUAL LANDOWNERS MUST TAKE A PERSONAL INTEREST! Aid in clean-up work through the Agricultural Conservation Program is available to any woodland owner at \$4.00 per acre on areas up to 15 acres. The County Agent should be consulted.

Support your local Forest Fire Wardens and Deputies. They are planning, with State and Federal agencies, an intensive campaign to control fires. Help them by strict observance of the fire laws. Kindle no open fires without a permit from the Warden except when the ground is covered with snow. Co-operate by reporting fires you may see and in other ways. Fire fighting tool supplies are inadequate and should be reasonably increased by many towns. YOU CAN HELP, AND IT WILL PAY, TO PREVENT FOREST FIRES!

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairss

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pelham, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year

ensuing.

2. To see if the town will vote to adopt the town budget as prepared by the budget committee, or make any alterations of additions thereto.

- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,495.50 as the town's share of State Aid Construction of highways, or take any other action relative thereto.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$486.92 as the town's share of Town Road Aid for the construction of Class V. roads, as recommended by the budget committee.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to lay out a highway from Webster Ave., so called, near the house of Thomas Griffin to the road known as the Woods road, a private way, near the shore of Island Pond, or take any other action relative thereto. (Not included in the budget.)

6. To see if the town will vote to set aside from the Town Maintenance of Highways, a sum sufficient to oil, or tar, Woodbury Ave., or some other highway as the meeting

may determine.

7. To see if the town will vote to rescind the action taken on Article 8. at last Annual Meeting of March 1938: and vote to deposit all money received from the sales of the Martina A. Gage property in a special fund, the income of the same to be used to aid in defraying cost of necessary repairs on Town Halll and Library after deducting necessary expenses incident to sale and administration.

8. To see how much money the town will vote to pay on the Town Debt, and to determine if the town will vote to pay the emergency loan of \$2,000.00 in three instalments, one due December 1, 1939, of \$666.67 and a like amount on two successive years, as approved by the budget committee.

9. To see if the town will vote to establish a rate for the use of the Town Hall, and set forth what organizations may have the use of said hall at a reduced or free rate.

10. To see if the town will vote to elect two or more persons to act with the selectmen as appraisers of Real Estate for the 1939 appraisal.

11. To see if the town will vote to grant a discount on the 1939 tax list on all property taxes paid in full, 2% on of before July 15, 1939; 1% on or before September 1, 1939, or take any action relative thereto.

12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.

13. To see if the town will vote to levy a 20 cent fine on all poll taxes not paid before December 1, 1939.

14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when they make their annual appraisal in April.

15. To transact any other business that may legally

come before said meeting.

#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

#### Disaster 1938

It was voted to pay twenty-six hundred dollars toward the town debt at the last annual town meeting, which has been done but owing to conditions beyond our control we have had to borrow two thousand dollars, but still we figure we are \$1,061.99 better than in 1937.

We have had to fix our roads twice from flood damage, we had just got one road repaired when along came the second flood and washed it out much worse than the first time, costing us over one thousand dollars to put back in shape, using the W. P. A. to work along with the town help.

If it had not been for the W. P. A. this flood damage and hurricane damage would have cost the town many thousands of dollars to put the town back in the same condition it was before these disasters.

We wish to thank all department heads, they have cooperated in every way with us in all our undertakings this year and kept as near their budget as possible.

You will probably note that the Town Hall expenses went over by several hundred dollars, but two years ago it was voted to shingle the town shed which was never done we did it this year at a cost of \$125.00. A new water system was put in the hall at a cost of over \$100.00, which we believe is an asset to the renting of the hall, also the clock on the church was repaired out of this appropriation, and revenue from the Town Hall was \$91,00, so figuring it all together it did not exceed the \$300.00 appropriation so very much.

We all look forward to a better and prosperous year of 1939.

There were two changes in the teaching staff in Pelham this year. Miss Doris Delaware, a graduate of the High School Curriculum at Keene Normal school, was elected to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Miss Bernice Lester at the Junior High school, and Miss Katherine Smith, a graduate of the Elementary School Curriculum at Keene Normal school, was elected to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Miss Mildred Shunaman at the Currier school.

Three school houses were damaged by the September hurricane. At the Junior High school the chimney was blown over, causing a bad hole in the roof. At the Center school a tree fell across one corner of the building, causing only slight damage. At the Currier school a large number of shingles were blown off the roof, necessitating the reshingling of one side of this school.

Achievement tests were given in all of the schools the latter part of last year and intelligence and achievement tests will be given this year. An effort is being made by the teachers to adapt the school work to the individual ability and needs of each child.

The registration in the high school as of January first was twenty-eight, nine pupils in Grade 10 and nineteen pupils in Grade 9.

We are glad to observe over a period of years that the percentage of graduates from Junior High who return to continue in high school is definitely on the increase. This year the graduates of J. H. Class of 1938 who were still residents of Pelham enrolled this fall in the high school 100 %.

The school nurse has given us her usual careful health supervision, and in connection with the health activities we are pleased to say that hot soup is again being served at school during the cold months, through the co-operation of the local P. T. A.

Last year we received a set of Encyclopædia Britannica as a gift to our school, and we are pleased to note a healthy growth in the school library.

Our school activities this year include a Social Society and a school paper, "The Tattler," and club activities under outside direction meet twice monthly.

Again this year we have received the commendation of the State Board of Education for our tardiness record, and we are hoping to have as near a perfect record for both tardiness and absence as possible in the current year. The teachers wish to thank the superintendent, school officials, and all those who have contributed to making the past year a very successful one for the school.

The P. T. A. also sponsored the soup project and the Red Cross furnished shoes and rubbers to those in real need.

Christmas joy was brought to a number of children in several homes by generous gifts from some of the charitably minded ladies of the community.
