To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: Polls open 10 A. M. close 7. P. M.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pelham, on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, and as provided by law.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the year ensuing and make appropriations of the same. That is to see if the town will vote to accept the Town Budget as prepared by the Budget Committee and to take action thereon.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart \$1,863 as the town's share of State Aid Construction on the Animal Farm Road, the State to contribute \$5,589 as the State's share.
- 4. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$559.55 as the town's share of Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$2,238.21 as the state's share.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to add to the Zoning and Building by-laws, "Permits must be obtained for all repairs, additions, and alterations in buildings."
- 6. To see if the town will vote to add to the Zoning Bylaws, That no permission shall be granted, to locate trailer camps, or overnight cabins within the limits of the town of Pelham.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$124 (1/100 of one percent of the town's valuation based on the 1948 assessment) to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing the natural advantages of the town in co-operation with the other 37 communities in the Merrimack Valley Region.

- 8. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to invite the State Tax Commission to assist the Selectmen in reappraisal of the Town and appropriate money for the same.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when they make their appraisal in April.
- 10. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to grant a discount on all property taxes of the 1949 list, paid in full, on or before August 1, 1949, 2 percent; on or before October 1, 1949, 1 percent, or take any action relative thereto.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise \$2,682.27 to cover the deficit in 1948 expenditures.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen of Pelham, by this report wish to give in a few words, the condition of the Town.

As you know over \$3,000 was spent in conditioning and tarring the road on the South side of Island Pond, the Gibson Hill road was also put in good condition at a cost of nearly \$600. Due to the rising prices the highway maintenance and snow removal cost more than usual.

During the preceding winter the old snow plow cost too much for repairs, consequently the Selectmen have bargained for a plow to replace it.

The School tax was about \$4,000 more than the previous year, expenses due to high costs in every item of the budget were more than the estimates.

We ask the Budget Committee to consider not only what we need but the costs of all services that they propose in making up the budget.

AUDITORS' REPORT

We, the undersigned Auditors of the Town of Pelham, hereby certify that we have examined the books and accounts of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Treasurer of Trust Funds, Treasurer of Cemetery Trustees, and Treasurer of Library Trustees.

We find that the Selectmen have issued orders on the Treasury to the amount of \$76,254.16. All orders were correctly cast and properly vouched.

We find that the Treasurer had on hand, January 1, 1948, \$3,808.36. He has received from all sources \$74,399.11 and has paid the above mentioned orders, leaving a balance on hand, December 31, 1948, of \$1,953.31.

The Tax Collector's accounts are as follows. She has collected in taxes and interest \$45,663.25 of the 1948 levy, \$7,309.23 of the uncollected 1947 levy, \$61.08 of the uncollected 1946 levy, \$45.20 of the uncollected 1945 levy, and \$38.10 of the uncollected 1944 levy. All sums collected have been paid over to the Treasurer. There are no longer any uncollected taxes for the years 1944, 1945, and 1946. There is \$43.60 uncollected for 1947 and \$10,377.81 for 1948. The Selectmen have issued tax abatements to the amount of \$608.04. The amount of the Tax Sale was \$438.96, including taxes, costs, and interest.

We find that the Town Clerk has received \$50.52 in auto permits 1947-48, \$2,446.38 in permits for 1948-49, and \$17.84 in permits for 1949-50. These sums have been paid over to the Treasurer. He has received \$461.00 in dog licenses, retained \$39.00 in fees and paid to the Treasurer \$422.00.

The Trust Funds now amount to \$14,211.77. The Treasurer of Trust Funds has an unexpended balance of \$372.45. The Capital Reserve Fund (School), which is in the hands of the Trustees of Trust Funds, amount to \$1,502.50.

The Cemetery Trustees had on hand January 1, 1948 the sum of \$26.95. They have received from all sources \$536.00. They have expended \$545.96 and have on hand, December 31, 1948 the sum of \$16.99.

The Library Trustees had on hand January 1, 1948, \$31.68, received from all sources \$581.55, expended \$518.66, and have on hand December 31, 1948 the sum of \$94.57.

The Gage Fund amounts to \$250.39.

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Pelham, N. H., qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 19th day of March, 1949, at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
- 9. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing two years.
- 10. To see if the District will vote to build a new centralized school or an addition to the existing Junior High School.
- 11. To see if the District will vote to raise by bond issue and appropriate to school construction and equipment a sum of money not to exceed 5% of the assessed valuation of the town.

- 12. To see if the District will vote to add the funds in the capital reserve to the purpose of article 10.
- 13. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to apply for and accept any funds which may be made available by the U. S. Government or any department or agency thereof and/or by the State of New Hampshire for the erection of school facilities.
- 14. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500. to provide fire escapes on the Junior High school.
- 15. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 to increase the toilet facilities at the Junior High school.
- 16. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to provide an additional well at Junior High school.
- 17. To see if the District will vote to atuhorize the School Board to sell the school houses at Gage Hill, Gumpus and No. 1 at the Center or any of them. If voted in the affirmative, to determine the manner of sale.
- 18. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Pelham, N. H. February 10, 1949.

To the School Board and Citizens of the School District of Pelham:

This is the third annual report that I offer you concerning your schools.

The quality of instruction in your schools is good. An effort has been made to provide textbooks which are reasonably up-to-date in content and more attractive in form. The increase in interest value does much to hold pupil interest. It is our hope to continue to improve the teaching materials.

The transportation of pupils always brings problems. It has been pleasant to feel that nearly all have been solved for this year through awarding contracts which brought about the purchase of new, more adequate buses. The increase in number of pupils will not allow this condition to exist for a long time.

The increase in number of pupils makes another demand —for increased housing. The number in each of the upper grades has become too large to allow two grades to be seated in one room next year. We have come to the time when it seems necessary to try to plan for new school housing facilities. Because a better educational program can be developed with a single grade per teacher than in a multi-grade room, it seems wise to think in terms of a centralized school. Although building costs are still high, there are indications that more favorable conditions will appear soon. There is also a possibility that federal funds may soon be made available for construction. I venture to express the hope that favorable action will be taken on the proposal to build a fourroom unit to be used with the present Junior High building as a central school. I believe that we should call attention to the possible waste in using funds to develop make-shift facilities to care for present needs while only postponing briefly the large expenditure to provide a more permanent solution of the problem.

It would not be fair to close this report without some mention of the loss which we feel in the passing of two lives that had such profound influence on the educational development in Pelham. It would be difficult to find a teacher whose quiet enthusiasm for better living and useful citizenship has had more favorable impression that did Mrs. Catherine Donoyan. On the business side of school management we shall long remember the sincerity and integrity that Mr. Ernest G. Sherburne showed us in all his dealings as a member of the School Board. We shall do well if we strive to attain as high a rating in good citizenship as these two held.

At present we are getting over a slight epidemic of measles. It was in all sections of the town.

Last March, Mrs. Birchall, the T. B. Nurse of Nashua, N. H., and I put the Patch Test on 67 pupils of the Junior High School and 4 pupils were taken to Nashua for chest X-rays and I am happy to report, we have no active case of T. B. among our pupils.

In October, I had the pleasure of using the new Massachusetts Vision Test, that our Supervisory Union bought, on our pupils and I really feel that now we can find any eye strain or defective vision and our pupils can be advised to consult an occulist for further treatment.

The School Board has been having a drive against pediculosis and although we had a few cases in town during the vear, I would like to thank the parents for helping to keep our children's heads clean, and if any one needs advice, I will be glad to give it to the best of my ability.

I would like to thank Mr. Canfield, the School Board, the teachers and all the parents who have co-operated with me in the past, and hope that they will continue to do so in the future.
